AFFIDAVIT OF STEVE HASSELMAN

- I, STEVE HASSELMAN, of the City of Hamilton in the Province of Ontario, MAKE OATH AND SAY:
- 1) I am employed with the City of Hamilton as the Superintendent of Parks District North of the Hamilton Parks and Cemeteries Section. As such, I have knowledge of the matters set out in this my affidavit. Where I rely on the information of others, I state the source of that information and verily believe it to be true.
- 2) Parks District North is composed of the downtown area and much of the lower city of Hamilton. In my role as Superintendent, I oversee most of the areas of Hamilton in which encampments are located.
- 3) I have visited all of the encampments located in public parks in Parks District North, often as part of implementing our Standard Operating Procedure for encampment cleanups. In the course of this work I have had the opportunity to make observations of the encampments and their impact on the parks in which they are located.

Impact of Encampments on Park Lands and Facilities

- 4) I have seen evidence of encampment occupants felling and burning trees, and clearing areas for tents.
- 5) I have observed that prior to 2020, while encampments have existed, they have been smaller and fewer in number. There would only be temporary tents on site. I am now seeing larger and more permanent structures being erected, sometimes incorporating trees present on site, to which wood pallets and A-frames are attached via screws and nails. Some of these structures contain furniture and appliances.
- 6) The presence of encampments has caused grass to die back to bare dirt and has caused soil compaction due to the length of time the encampments are set up on site. The rubberized surfaces on playgrounds is being damaged from the increased wear.
- 7) Without limitation, I have witnessed this in encampments located in Kay Drage Park, Central Park, Beasley Park, Shamrock Park, and the Corktown Park, (which is located in the Niagara Escarpment World Biosphere Reserve).

Fires at Kay Drage Park

- 8) I am aware of at least two fires taking place in Kay Drage Park. The first occurred on April 12, 2021. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "A"** to this my Affidavit are photographs depicting the damage and clean up.
- 9) The second was a large fire, also occurring on April 28, 2021, involving approximately 30 propane tanks and caused extensive damage. Hamilton Fire and the OPP became involved.

Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit** "B" to this my Affidavit are photographs depicting the damage and clean up.

10) In addition to the efforts of the City staff for clean up, the clean up cost the City \$6,508.00 in additional expenses for a contractor, Quantum Murray, to assist with the clean up. Attached hereto and marked as Exhibit "C" to this my Affidavit is a copy of the said invoice dated May 28, 2021.

Fire at Central Park

11)I am aware of a fire at Central Park on May 19, 2021, which resulted in a lot of debris and required cleanup. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "D"** to this my Affidavit are photographs depicting the damage and clean up.

Fires at Beasley Park

- 12)I am aware of two separate fires at Beasley Park, one occurring on May 31, 2021 which caused significant damage to the fence along the east part of the part. Hamilton Police and the fire department responded. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "E"** to this my Affidavit is a photo depicting the damage.
- 13) The other fire occurring in Beasley Park occurred June 22, 2021 and caused additional damage to approximately 24 feet of fence, and five trees. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "F"** to this my Affidavit is a photo depicting the damage.

Cost of Remediation

14) The damage to the parks has caused the city to incur additional expenses for repair and replacement to park lands, trees, and structures such as fences. Attached hereto and

marked as **Exhibit "G"** to this my affidavit is a chart detailing expenses to four such sites, totaling \$60,718.76. Further repair and remediation expenses are expected.

Garbage and Waste

- 15)The quantity of garbage and waste to be cleaned up in Park District North has increased significantly since 2020 as compared to previous years, and waste has often been strewn about inside and near encampment sites. We have found buckets of feces, used condoms, and signs of defecation in bushes near encampments, all of which present biological hazards. The Public Health Department has assisted the Parks and Cemeteries Section with these issues.
- 16) The amount of human waste and the potential presence of used needles prevents the waste from being disposed of at the transfer station. Instead, it must be transported to Glanbrook. The City has hired a subcontractor Quantum Murray to assist with waste removal and transport.

Vandalism

17) We have had issues with encampment occupants removing the electrical wiring from the band shell at Gage Park. As well, there have been two occasions on which copper pipe from the public washrooms in Gage Park was stolen. The copper pipe was stolen first in spring of 2021, then replaced; and the newly replaced copper pipe was stolen again approximately one month later. After that incident, Parks and Cemeteries workers locked the washrooms to prevent further vandalism.

18)Other types of vandalism are prevalent in nearly every location where encampments are situated. This includes graffiti, including graffiti on trees; and damage to permanent structures such as holes cut in fences to create a passageway through the fence.







AFFIDAVIT OF STEVE HASSELMAN (SWORN OCTOBER 11, 2021)

- I, STEVE HASSELMAN, of the City of Hamilton in the Province of Ontario, MAKE OATH AND SAY:
- 1. I am employed with the City of Hamilton (the "City") as the Superintendent of Parks District North of the Hamilton Parks and Cemeteries Section. As such, I have knowledge of the matters set out in this my affidavit. Where I rely on the information of others, I state the source of that information and verily believe it to be true.
- 2. I make this affidavit as a supplement to my affidavit sworn October 7, 2021.
- I have had the opportunity to review the affidavit of Kara Bunn, sworn October 8, 2021.
 I agree with and adopt her evidence. Ms. Bunn is the Manager of the Parks and Cemeteries Section to whom I report.

Safety Concerns Related to Encampments

- 4. I have witnessed an encampment occupant carrying an axe. I have also observed other potential weapons in the possession of encampment occupants, including but not limited to baseball bats, knives and needles.
- 5. Concerning needles, historically, we would normally find a few needles related to intravenous drug use after cleaning up at or near an encampment. We have prepared 'sharps disposal kits' for addressing these needles when found. Attached hereto and marked as Exhibit "A" is a document showing the proper use of our 'sharps disposal kits'.
- 6. I note and refer to the Affidavit of Kara Bunn which indicates that in 2021 to date there have been 109 attendances by Parks workers for needle cleanup in Parks District North.
 This is consistent with my observation in Parks District North.
- 7. Where parks contain sharps disposal containers, it is my observation that the sharps disposal containers are not being used, and there are still substantial numbers of needles being found on the ground, where they pose a safety risk for anyone walking through the area.
- 8. In 2020 I became aware of incidents in which apparent 'trip lines' were placed along the Waterfront Trail. A video was sent to me which depicted these 'trip lines'. In the video, the 'trip lines' appeared to be strong enough to knock down a pedestrian or bicyclist on the walkways and appeared to have been placed by an encampment occupant named Brian Whittaker.

- 9. When these hazards have been located, they have been removed or otherwise addressed, either by the Parks and Cemeteries Section, or by other appropriate City departments.
- 10. There has also been a change in the demeanor of the encampment occupants. I have observed that they have become territorial of the areas where the encampments are located, which makes those areas of the parks functionally inaccessible to other members of the public.

Impact of Encampments on Park Lands and Facilities

- 11. In addition to the impacts described in my October 7, 2021 Affidavit, there are other examples which illustrate the impact of the encampments on the park lands and facilities.
- 12. In summer 2021, the Rotary Club sponsored a literacy camp for children at Woodlands Park. An encampment in Woodlands Park created issues for the literacy camp. Parents and children attending the camp reported feeling unsafe. I am aware of reports that encampment occupants were arguing, using foul language, and using drugs. The program staff walked the grass each morning looking for needles and other paraphernalia. On August 24, 2021, there was a drug overdose near the end of the program for the day, and program staff reported having observed drug dealing taking place from an encampment tent all morning. The parents of the children attending the camp and the program staff expressed concern for the safety of the children and the community.
- 13. In summer of 2021, including June and July 2021, there was an encampment located in Gage Park. The Gage Park bandshell sustained extensive damage from a break-in on the night of June 2, 2021. The main power distribution in the electrical system was completely destroyed. There was also extensive walls, counters and sink damage in the washrooms.

The City retained an electrical contractor to perform repairs. Restoring power to the splash pad was prioritized, because of the hot weather and the upcoming weekend. It took 2 days (until June 4, 2021) to restore power to the splash pad. The lighting to the pathway was restored June 5, 2021. In the meantime, before the lighting was restored, the Parks Security Patrol was dedicated to the Gage Park site at night time until power could be restored to the pathway lighting.

- 14. Attached hereto and marked collectively as **Exhibit "B"** to this my Affidavit are nineteen (19) photographs taken June 3, 2021 depicting the condition of the Gage Park bandshell after the vandalism to the electrical panels and washrooms.
- 15. On or around July 6, 2021 the Gage Park bandshell was vandalized again. The backflow and all the piping was removed from the men's washroom. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "C"** to this my Affidavit is a photograph showing the damage to the men's washroom in the Gage Park bandshell.

Concerns Reported by Community Members

16. The encampments have also prompted complaints from non-encamped members of the community who wish to use the parks or who live near encampments. The City keeps logs of calls from members of the public and those that concern Parks North are directed to me. The logs contain the personal contact information of people who may not want that contact information disclosed. A representative sample of the content of these logs includes the following:

- a. November 4, 2020: A caller reported 4 tents in Gage Park. One of these was not secured and was blowing around. The caller reported a huge mess in the park, with a shopping cart tipped over and garbage all over the park.
- b. February 22, 2021: A caller reported that there was a lot of garbage in the Lucy Day Park that had been left behind from an encampment. The caller stated the park looks disgusting and that a dumpster is probably needed. The caller noted that children play in that park.
- c. March 2, 2021: A caller reported extensive amounts of needles, drug paraphernalia, feces and garbage all over Cathedral Park.
- d. April 7, 2021: A caller reported that the fire department had put out a fire the night before at JC Beemer Park. There was garbage and debris all over the park from the fire. The caller stated there is at least 5 tents with people living in them who are making a mess all over the park with junk and garbage.
- e. July 5, 2021: A resident reported trash and garbage all over the park near Ray Street and York Boulevard. The caller was very upset and wanted it investigated and cleaned up.
- f. July 20, 2021: a caller reported someone living in the York Boulevard parkette and a lot of garbage all over the place, it was blowing on to other properties;
- g. August 25, 2021: a caller reported 25 to 30 feet of garbage bags and loose garbage dumped in the York Boulevard parkette, and stated that unhoused people were opening garbage bags, rummaging through the garbage, taking what they want, and leaving the rest. The caller felt this was a public health risk

- h. August 26, 2021: a caller reported garbage at JC Beemer Park. The caller reported that although some garbage was cleaned up the day before, another huge mess was made. The group that had been in the encampment the day before seemed to have abandoned it. Another group came and aggressively sorted through all of the stuff left behind, and it has created an even larger mess.
- i. September 18, 2021: A caller reported a complaint about the encampment at Woodlands Park. While the caller was sympathetic to people living in tents in city parks, and stated that they have seen tents that do not impinge on the park, but this is not the case in Woodlands Park. The caller reported several rambling tent like structures all surrounded by trash and discarded items. There is even one discarded sofa bed tipped over next to one tent.
- j. September 22, 2021: A caller reported a complaint about an encampment at Dundurn Park. The caller was upset about the way encampments were handled, stating that they called numerous times about tents, fecal matter, and needles at the playground in Dundurn park. The caller wanted the encampment cleaned up right away.
- k. September 23, 2021: A caller reported occupants of an encampment at the Claremont access parkette were using the area along the fence line for defecation, resulting in mounds of human feces and excrement.
- September 30, 2021: A caller reported needles on the east side of the parkette near Claremont access.
- m. October 5, 2021: A caller attempting to ride a bike on the trail near the Redhill parkway and the north side of Queenston Road reported skids, furniture, and air conditioners on the trail, causing the caller almost to fall over the items as the caller was riding their bike.

n. October 6, 2021: A caller requested cleanup of garbage left behind on a lot on Ferrie Street after an encampment moved on. The caller believed there may be needles present but had not actually seen any.

- I, Steve Hasselman, of the City of Hamilton, in the Province of Ontario, AFFIRM:
- 1. I am an employee of the City Hamilton as such I have knowledge of the matters set out in my affidavit. Where I rely on the information of others, I state the source of that information and verily believe it to be true.
- 2. I make this affidavit as an update and supplement to my October 7th ("**Affidavit**") and October 11th, 2021 ("**Supplementary Affidavit**"), in this proceeding, which I have

reviewed in preparation for giving this Affidavit.1

- 3. Paragraphs 1-3 of both my Affidavit and Supplementary Affidavit (regarding my job title and duties, and the ongoing encampment situation at the Parks and Cemeteries) remain accurate, with an additional update that I am no longer the superintendent of Parks North; as of June 24, 2024, I am now the superintendent of Parks West.
- 4. I began my role as parks superintendent in 2013 or 2014. During my visits, especially while implementing our Standard Operating Procedure ("SOP") for encampment cleanups after COVID-19 (Public Works Document #PW-P-019-011 titled "Sleeping Rough Camps Response for Total Clean-Up"), I have noticed a significant increase in the number of encampment occupants. This increase in encampments has come with an increase in damage to the parks and their facilities, such as damage to trees (graffiti and axe or hatchet damage), damage to grounds, theft of picnic tables; accumulated garbage and human waste, and discarded used needles. On multiple occasions, light standards and other electrical equipment near encampments have been broken open and the wiring inside pulled out so that people can tap into the electricity. The wiring is left exposed and is very dangerous.
- 5. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "A"** to this my Affidavit is a copy of the SOP. The SOP directs how cleanup is to be performed; it does not direct when cleanup is to be performed (which is dictated by the 2023 Encampment Protocol). The SOP for Parks staff is onerous in order to mitigate risks to staff from the hazards that are present.

¹ All defined terms in my Affidavit and Supplementary Affidavit have the same meaning in this Affidavit.

Parks staff are required to use biohazard collection materials and, at times, wear Tyvek suits as well as other personal protective equipment in order to do their cleanup work.

- 6. Attached hereto as **Exhibit "B"** are copies of photographs pictures taken by me on April 23, 2024, April 21, 2024, and April 13, 2024, respectively showing recent vandalism at Bayfront Park.
- 7. Paragraphs 4-13 of my Affidavit and paragraphs 4-10 of my Supplementary Affidavit (regarding the impact of encampment on Park Lands and Facilities, and the safety concerns related to encampments) also remain accurate.
- 8. There continue to be incidents of fire originating from encampments within the Park lands and facilities. These incidents pose serious dangers to the public and other encampment occupants. They also cause significant damage to City Parks, necessitating extensive cleanups that require additional staff and expenses.
- 9. By way of example, I personally witnessed the aftermath a large fire at JC Beemer Park in November 2021, which involved several propane tanks exploding and caused significant damage to the park. The area along Strachan Avenue is another area that has required a significant amount of remediation due to damage from encampments.
- 10. There also continue to be reports of aggressive and threatening behaviors from encampment occupants in Parks North parks. These include:

- (a) A man walking around with a large machete while Parks staff were attempting snow removal and winter maintenance in front of City Hall in March 2024;
- (b) In Bayfront Park, encamped people tapping into light standards to access the wiring inside and taking picnic tables into their tents so that the rest of the people using parks cannot use them;
- (c) In an encampment around Ferguson Station in May 2024, encampment residents openly smoking crack in front of children;
- (d) In June 2024, a man at an encampment near Strachan and Bay Streets exposed himself to a female Parks staff student who was attempting to cut the grass. Police ultimately arrested the man. The student was very upset and had to leave work after the incident, although she was able to return the next day;
- (e) Also in June 2023, in the Delta parkette near Rosslyn Avenue, Main Street East, and King Street East, a man from a nearby encampment approached female students who were attempting to cut the grass and stated "I usually can't control myself around females, bad things usually happen." The students present, both male and female, reported feeling deeply uncomfortable. On this occasion encampment residents also told the staff attempting to cut the grass to "stay away from my area."

- (f) Attached hereto and marked as <u>Exhibit "C"</u> to this my Affidavit are copies of internal emails describing these and other incidents.
- 11. Paragraph 16 of my Supplementary Affidavit (regarding the ongoing concerns reported by community members) remains accurate. I have seen an increase in concerns being reported since my Affidavit and my Supplementary Affidavit. Parks staff continue to receive and respond to complaints from members of the community regarding damages and disturbances caused by the occupants of the encampments. These calls often report incidents of vandalism, hazardous materials such as used needles, crack pipes, and broken glass, garbage and waste, and other disruptive and aggressive behaviours. There are multiple reports of discarded drug paraphernalia in areas where children play, such as playgrounds and t-ball fields. Attached hereto and marked as Exhibit "D" to this my Affidavit are copies of emails reporting other incidents in City Parks involving encampment occupants, with personal information from members of the public redacted.
- 12. Even when Parks staff are not directly involved in the response, these incidents are upsetting to hear about. I am aware of reports from a woman living near the escarpment in the Charlton Avenue area of a series of incidents in late 2021 in which individuals at an encampment nearby yelled racial slurs her and her husband; entered onto her property to sit on her porch or in her yard; shined lights into her windows; threw trash onto her property, and also cut down trees and burned fires near her property. This resident reported having experienced similar issues in 2019.

13. In the time since my Affidavit and my Supplementary Affidavit I have observed increasing behaviour on the part of encampment occupants that I would describe as "territorial," such as referring to the encampment site as "theirs" and becoming confrontational with Parks staff or others in the area.

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Title: Sleeping Rough Camps – Response for Total Clean-Up

Document # PW-P-019-011 Document Level Level II

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1 PURPOSE

To provide City of Hamilton Public Works staff instructions to safely and in a respectful manner clean up areas managed by Public Works which are being used by individuals as Sleeping Rough camps. This procedure details proper communication and safety procedures to be followed so that individuals in the encampments are connected with the Encampment Task Force, and all items within a Sleeping Rough camp are removed from City property safely and efficiently.

This procedure describes the process to be followed from the identification of an encampment or individual sleeping rough to clean-up of the specific location.

2 SCOPE

- This procedure only applies to homeless encampments or individuals sleeping rough in City of Hamilton managed properties including the public right of way and City Parks.
- This procedure only defines the actions and responsibilities of Public Works staff.

3 DEFINITIONS

Term	Definition
Connection Period	A period of time between when the Encampment Task Force receives initial notification of an encampment and ultimate resolution/clearing, when the City of Hamilton's Street Outreach team will engage the individuals in the encampment for the purposes of: identifying them, assessing their individual needs, notifying them of a date for potential dismantling of their encampment, and outlining alternate shelter &/or housing options available. This period of connection and engagement is based on the notice for dismantling and may be between 24 hours and 2 weeks (or longer, depending on special circumstances).
Designated Divisional Staff	Staff designated from each Division to perform responsibilities related to Sleeping Rough Encampments, such as initial site-visit, contacting the Encampment Task Force, scheduling clean-up etc. Refer to table in Section 4 for staff position(s) assigned for each Division.



Title: Sleeping Rough Camps – Response for Total Clean-Up

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Term	Definition
Emergency Clean Up	A clean-up in which Sleeping Rough Individuals or Encampment pose an immediate risk to public safety.
	Examples include but are not limited to:
	 Objects capable of harming individuals are present at the campsite including signs of starting fires, propane, sharps, knives, or other weapons that are prohibited from public spaces
	 Biohazards are present that could potentially infect someone if they come into contact with it
	 There is the potential for the public to come into contact with drug paraphernalia including needles, drug residue, or objects used in the drug making process which could harm someone.
	In addition to the above circumstances, locations listed within the agreed upon prohibited areas warrant an Emergency Clean Up.
	The estimated timeline for an Emergency Clean Up is within 24 hours of the site being identified as requiring a clean up.
Encampment Task Force	A response team comprised of Parks, Roadway Maintenance, Waste Collections, Housing Services, Street Outreach, Municipal Law Enforcement and Hamilton Police Service. Together a coordinated response is implemented to ensure identification, connection, rehabilitation, and clean-up are all executed efficiently and effectively.
Right-of-Way (ROW)	Includes the area where tasks are performed in the roadway and adjacent lands from private property line to private property line.
Sharps	Objects capable of causing punctures or cuts that could cause infection (e.g., needles, syringes, scalpels, blades, suture equipment, scissors, stylets, trocars, and glass that may contain blood, fluids, and tissues.)



Term	Definition
Sharps Kit	A City of Hamilton in-house safety kit with a guideline for proper handling and disposal of sharps. Kit includes latex gloves, plyers or tongs, alcohol wipes and spray, biohazard disposal container and operation and maintenance deficiency checklist pad.
Sleeping Rough	An individual residing outside because they can not or will not access other services.
Sleeping Rough Camp or Homeless Encampment	An area outside where groups of individuals reside because they can not or will not access other services.
Tyvek Suit	A high-density polyethylene fiber suit made from synthetic material to prevent external risk factors coming into contact with the employee.
	Risk factors include but are not limited to: insects, bodily fluid, chemicals, liquids, and aerosols.



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4 RESPONSIBILITY

 Each position named within this procedure is responsible for the action assigned to that position.

- The process defined within this procedure can be initiated by any of the following City of Hamilton sections including but not limited to Parks and Cemeteries, Roadway Maintenance, Waste Collections, Facilities, City Housing, Street Outreach, Healthy & Safe Communities, Harm Reduction, Municipal By-Law and / or Hamilton Police.
- Once initiated, to ensure the procedure is adhered to, communication and records must be clearly maintained as per Departmental Record Control requirements listed in the Control of Records (PW-P-016-001) procedure and following the Corporate Record Retention By-Law.
- The following divisional staff designated for their Division will perform the duties listed in this procedure for 'Designated Divisional Staff':

Division	Designated Divisional Staff
Environmental Services	Parks Investigator or Parks and Cemeteries Supervisor
Transportation Operations and Maintenance	Roadway Maintenance Supervisor
Energy, Fleet & Facilities Management (EFFM) Division	Civic Property Investigator or where appropriate, the Facilities Management Supervisor.

4.1 Environmental Services

- All clean-ups of individuals who are Sleeping Rough or Homeless Encampments located within City Parks and Cemeteries are the responsibility of the Parks & Cemeteries Section of Environmental Services Division.
- It is the responsibility of the Parks & Cemeteries Manager to ensure Environmental Services staff understand and are trained on this procedure.

4.2 Transportation Operations and Maintenance

- All clean-ups of individuals who are Sleeping Rough or Homeless Encampments located within the Public Right of Way are the responsibility of the Roadway Maintenance Section.
- Transportation Operations and Maintenance Division will also be responsible for cleaning up encampments from bus shelters/stops. Clean up activities in bus



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shelters/stops, that are not related to homeless encampments, will continue to be the responsibility of Transit Division.

 It is the responsibility of the Roadway Maintenance Manager to ensure Transportation Operations and Maintenance staff understand and are trained on this procedure.

4.3 Facilities

- All clean-ups of individuals who are Sleeping Rough or Homeless Encampments located in City of Hamilton Facilities and managed under the Energy, Fleet & Facilities Management (EFFM) Division are the responsibility of the Energy, Fleet and Facilities Management Division.
- It is the responsibility of the Civic Property Investigator or Facility Supervisor to ensure Facilities staff understand and are trained on this procedure.




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5 PROCEDURE

5.1 Initial Response and Investigation Procedure Process Flow Diagram



- 5.1.1. The procedure begins with an internal or external notification of the Sleeping Rough individual or camp and their location.
 - Notifications come in many forms, commonly received as: Hansen complaints, phone inquiries, social media posts, other Department, Divisions and Section referrals through phone, email, or word of mouth.
 - City staff who wish to make a notification of a Sleeping Rough Camp or Individuals may do so through the Customer Contact Centre.
 - Once notification is received, the Customer Contact Centre shall email the



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Encampment Task Force to begin the connection process.

- The Connection Process The e-mail sent to the Encampment Task Force works to inform them to begin their connection process with the individuals Sleeping Rough and offer and inform the individuals of the services available to them.
- The Encampment Task Force will determine if a clean up is required and if so, contact the responsible Department, Division or Section to request they proceed with either an Emergency Clean Up or Regular Clean Up procedure.
- 5.1.2. Once contacted by the Encampment Task Force, the appropriate person within the responsible Department, Division or Section shall visit the aforementioned location to determine the extent of the matter and to plan the required clean up.
 - The site visit should be planned and executed in a way that avoids risk to staff health and safety.
 - All staff onsite must be equipped with proper Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) with direct compliance to the Occupational Health and Safety Act and Regulations.
 - Refer to Working Alone Procedure (# COH-RQ-WI-006) to ensure safety during site visits. Additional staff may be scheduled to assist in any site visits.
 - Photographs, site inspection, exact location and any relevant documentation should be recorded during visit. Photos should only be taken of the site, to organize the clean up procedure; persons occupying the site should not be photographed.
 - Use GIS to confirm owner of property
 - o If updated ownership is needed contact Property Officer.
- 5.1.3. If the location is not managed by the Section assigned to the initial site visit, but within City Property, information will be passed on by the Section to the correct Department, Division, or Section, and the Designated Divisional Staff will follow up with the Encampment Task Force directing them to the Section, Division or Department responsible for the location based on GIS location and site visit investigation.
- 5.1.4. If the location is not within City Property, information will be forwarded to Municipal Law Enforcement email for further action.
- 5.1.5. If the location of the Sleeping Rough Individual or Encampment is within the assigned Section's managed properties, the Designated Divisional Staff shall confirm with the Encampment Task Force that they will proceed with the clean



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up as requested.

- 5.1.6. A date will be set to allow for total site clean-up between the responsible Section and the Encampment Taskforce:
 - A date for total site clean-up will be scheduled and the date may be between 24 hours and 2 weeks depending on circumstances.
 - Case workers and Sleeping Rough Individuals will be notified of clean-up date by Encampment Task Force.
- 5.1.7. Clean-up activities should start only after the individuals sleeping rough have moved from the site, to avoid risks to staff health and safety.
- 5.1.8. In circumstances where the responsible section has been informed that the individuals in the Sleeping Rough Camp or Homeless Encampment will stay within the site for a limited time, the Encampment Task Force will ask the individuals sleeping rough to place all the items considered as waste in a separate area outside of their camp area. City staff will then set up a work zone in this space that is outside of the area the individuals are staying and clean up the items to be removed.

5.2 Emergency Total Clean Up Procedure

- 5.2.1 Emergency clean up is determined by the Encampment Task Force and will be communicated to the Designated Divisional Staff / By-Law Officer.
- 5.2.2 If the Task Force decides an Emergency Clean up is required, the area is to be cleaned up and made safe for the public, staff and property as soon as is operationally feasible. The estimated timeline for clean up is within 24 hours of the site being identified as requiring a clean up, but the completion of this task will also depend on the Police / Encampment Task Force removing the persons occupying the site.
- 5.2.3 The Designated Divisional Staff / By-Law Officer is responsible to contact the Hamilton Police communications sections to schedule an officer be on site for an emergency clean-up.
- 5.2.4 Continue following clean-up procedures listed in Section 5.3 of this procedure.

5.3 Clean Up Procedure

5.3.1 Details are subject to change depending on size and location of Sleeping Rough Individual or Encampment.



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- 5.3.2 All miscellaneous items onsite are to be cleaned up and removed by the City crew bringing the area back to its original state.
- 5.3.3 Staff involved with the clean up of materials should be familiar with the Exposure to Infectious Materials Procedure to ensure materials that pose a risk to their health and safety are collected in a safe manner.
- 5.3.4 Manual material handling of any objects on site is to be avoided and is discouraged.
- 5.3.5 The clean up should be planned and executed in a way that reduces the likelihood of staff on site coming in personal contact with items to be cleaned up to reduce risks to health and safety.
- 5.3.6 All staff onsite must be properly trained to safely complete the work required and working in compliance with the Occupational Health and Safety Act.
- 5.3.7 All staff onsite must be equipped with proper Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) with direct compliance to the Occupational Health and Safety Act and Regulations.
- 5.3.8 Additional PPE required:
 - Safe Sharps Removal Kit (Inc: Latex gloves, tongs, alcohol wipes / spray, sharps container, safe handling instructions, disposal instructions and Operation and Maintenance Deficiency Checklist.
 - Biohazard Sharps Collector (Yellow)
 - Tyvek Suit (if required)
 - ANSI Cut Level 1 Gloves (if required to perform any manual material handling)
 - Emergency Two Way Radio
- 5.3.9 Equipment varies depending on location, and may include but not limited to:
 - Garbage Bags
 - Garbage Can onsite
 - Scoop Shovel(s) & Rake(s)
 - One-ton Work Truck with sides and tarp
 - Bob-Cat (grapple bucket attachment) If applicable
 - Backhoe (thumb bucket attachment) If applicable
- 5.3.10 After cleaning up a potentially Bed Bug infested location, staff are advised to perform a "self-inspection" and other precautionary measures as per the City of Hamilton Corporate Bed Bugs Guideline.



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- 5.3.11 All waste materials collected from clean up are to be brought to the nearest Transfer Station for disposal. Sharps will be disposed of at the nearest City Household Hazardous Waste Dropoff Depots.
 - 27 Olympic Dr. (Dundas)
 - 460 Kenora Ave. (East Hamilton)
 - 37 Kilbride Rd. (Hamilton Mountain)

5.4 Procedure Steps specific to each section:

<u>Transportation Operations & Maintenance Division</u>

- Roads Supervisor to notify superintendent and By-Law in advance to schedule a crew for the designated cleanup date.
- Work order should contain Job Code for Roadway Maintenance events (RX-303).
 Details are subject to change depending on size and location of Sleeping Rough Individual or Encampment.
- Upon arrival, the Roads Supervisor may call off police assistance if the site is clear with no present dangers.

Parks and Cemeteries Section

- Park Investigator or Cemetery staff to notify Supervisors and Superintendent in advance to schedule a crew for the designated cleanup date.
- Work order should contain Job Code for Park & Cemetery Section events (PK# 053). Details are subject to change depending on size and location of Sleeping Rough Individual or Encampment.
- Upon arrival, the Supervisor may call off police assistance if the site is clear with no present dangers.

Facilities

- Civic Property Investigator or the Facilities Management Supervisor will issue a
 work order to schedule a crew for the designated cleanup date. Details are subject
 to change depending on size and location of Sleeping Rough Individual or
 Encampment.
- The Civic Property Investigator or Facility Management Supervisor shall contact Hamilton Police (non-emergency dispatch line) to schedule Police presence prior to the clean-up commencing.
- Upon arrival, the Civic Property Investigator or Facilities Management Supervisor may call off police assistance if the site is clear with no present dangers.



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5.5 Records Management

 All relevant correspondence, photographs, maps, and details must be saved by the Designated Divisional Staff in a designated folder on the City network or the designated Records Management System. The records should be clearly organized based on the specific Districts. Create sub-folders to clearly identify and group records for each individual sleeping rough case.

- Information should be shared with District Supervisors and Superintendents, so all are aware of active / completed sites within the district.
- Consistent record keeping and communication allows for timely connections, and clean-ups to maintain trust with the sleeping rough community.
- Records resulting from this process shall follow Departmental Record Control requirements and the Corporate Record Retention By-Law.





Good morning, Steve.

I was by Bishops Gate park today and wanted to document the several issues with its current situation.

- 1) (F.) Maximum Personal Space Allotment(s)
 - a. Some of the set-ups (photos attached) are well beyond the size allotment according to the protocol.
 - i. Within the protocol it says; Any items outside of the allotted personal space area will be subject to removal by city staff. See Photos.
- 2) (D. #4) Within 10m of any private property line.
 - i. Against the North fence.
- 3) D. #12) On any pathway, sidewalk or parking lot (They are not on the paths, but tents / belongings are well within the 5m from pathway)
 - i. Potential H&S risk for the individuals sleeping rough while staff mechanically maintain the pathways.
- 4) (D. #17) No temporary shelter or tent will be placed against Or be attached to any permanent structure
 - i. Tents attached to Tree's
 - ii. Tent against North fence (Fire on Nov. 2nd same location ruined wooden fence and park trees).

I have requested clarity, and I know we have spoken on the topic as well. If the fire on Nov. 2nd was due to homeless, according to the protocol, I'm not sure what response should have been executed according to the Encampment Response Process.

Note: It's been 83 days since the fire at Bishops

- (B) "When an encampment Or tent is located on public property, within a prohibited area"
 - Because current protocol rules are being broken, situating the homeless in a 'prohibited' area

or

- (C) "When an encampment Or tent is located on public property, is not in a prohibited area, but health and safety concerns are identified"
- Because obvious H&S issues are present, but Bishops park (besides fence proximity, path proximity and attached to a fixed structure) is a sanctioned site.

Due to the current situation of Bishops Park, and areas of concern for staff, homeless and neighbouring citizens – I have included Vince B to this e-mail. The situation is not as big at Woodlands, but the space isn't either. There truly isn't any space available for the public to use, let alone safely.

Should we stop our services to this park until the protocol is followed, and space is either safe / vacated?

Please let me know your thoughts on the issues mentioned, and escalate the issues as you see fit.

I wanted to let you know city hall is all completed to the best of my staffs ability while following the guidelines of 5m from encampments.

A couple issues that did arise are:

- staff was approached to go away as ppl were trying to sleep. Staff handled it professionally explaining their maintenance requirements and continued safely to get the job done.
- Once a couple homeless got up, a lot started emerging from their tents. They were walking all around and making it more difficult and slower for staff to navigate. They did manage to complete the work with no issues.
- The individuals at City Hall may not have anywhere to use a washroom facility. They were picking spots to do their morning business. It does make it a little awkward for staff especially my female employees.
- Three individuals came in from Bay st. Area and walked right into the large grouping on the West side of city hall. An individual I believe in the 'kitchen' tent was punched in the face and had to receive care from other homeless. I asked if he was ok, they said yes. He was visually bleeding from his nose and mouth. Photo attached.

- Once this occurred an individual with a blue shirt and dark mid length messy hair was walking around with a very large machette. I have taken a photo to the best of my ability.

My staff were away from the area and in no danger, however this is a major safety concern for the general public and City Hall staff with weapons like this onsite.

I did ask the security guards to monitor the front area as that's where all the action was and they were standing up by the horse shoe.

All in all it out winter maintenace work was completed and staff are on their routes. I just wanted to bring this to everyone's attention as soon as possible.



Good afternoon

I want to bring to your attention some concerns raised today at Bayfront Park.

Light post vandalism

We have a lamp post that is consistently being vandalized by one encampment individual. I have reported this to Unsheltered and requested that this individual be removed from the Park. Unsheltered sent the request to Police who conducted a "risk assessment" of the entire park and cited that there was no risk to public safety and refused to remove this person. After I received that response, we have observed the following:

- The individual has tapped into the same light post on multiple occasions creating a safety hazard for the public. I have attached a photo for reference. We have been reporting this to the police and so far have not received a response. In fact, we have been directed to report this type of behaviour on line instead of calling them. I will be sending another email to Unsheltered in regards to this issue.

Picnic Tables Going Missing

An event organizer brought to our attention that they will be requiring picnic tables for their event however in the past they have been able to use the tables that are on site. The problem is homeless have been re-locating the tables into their tents so there are very few tables left for events. We could add more tables but I believe this patten will continue. Just looking for guidance on how you would like this to be managed. I foresee this being an issue at Gage this summer as well.

Bayfront Washrooms

Our students will be opening and closing the washrooms at Bayfront Park soon. The students during orientation today hve already brought up concerns due to the number of homeless in the Park. We can already see that there will be issues around these washrooms especially during closing so I am formally requesting that we have contractors manage this site and Garthshore building at Pier 4. We would need cleaners and security to manage these sites.

Bayfront Incidents

We were informed of an incident at Bayfront over the weekend where a resident allegedly was assaulted by an encampment resident who was carrying a knife. Is it possible to request a weekly Risk Assessment from Police to ensure there are no weapons or risk to both staff working at Bayfront and Public Safety?

R zone specifically indicates that staff have the authority to remove individuals from a Park for specific activities. The police will not support that action so we will need to come up with a strategy that protects workers during the work day while meeting the agenda of the Encampment protocol because right now these policies contradict each other.

I know at one point extra security was added to City Hall to protect workers while occupied by encampment individuals so it may be time to look at doing the same at Bayfront.

Good afternoon

This morning at approximately 10:40am, we had a grass crew cutting the grass on Strachan Ave near the Bay St Intersection (Bay and Strachan). While operating a ride on mower, one of my female students witnessed a man exposing himself to her amongst doing other things to himself.

My student immediately got herself away from the man and brought this to her Lead Hand's attention. The Lead Hand immediately moved his crew to a safe location and they contacted their Supervisor. The Supervisor advised they call 911 and police responded immediately.

The student was obviously very upset so the Supervisor moved her to the Bayfront yard to get her away from the situation. Police ended up arresting the man and came down to Bayfront yard and spoke with the student. The student chose not to press charges as this would mean going to court which she did not want to do. The police were very good with her and offered counselling services if needed. The man arrested was homeless and originally from London ON. The police advised us that he would be released due to there being no charges laid however he was being transported back to London.

I allowed the student to go home and she was feeling much better when she left. I asked her to contact us if she wasn't able to come in tomorrow however she said she was feeling much better and was confident she would be back in tomorrow.

I wanted to make sure everyone included here had a record of this incident. We have had multiple incidents in the Bayfront/Strachan area since they have allowed homeless to live in the Park and we are going to continue reporting them and putting in safety measures to protect our staff. We will start using the reporting structure once R zone is implemented but for now I want to make sure incidents involving criminal activity against our staff is captured for tracking purposes and decision making in the future





I'm hoping to get a little further clarity on what our permit covers with regards to the encampments protocols. Thank you for sending along the Encampment Protocol, would Bayfront park be considered a sanctioned encampment site? I didn't see anything event-specific in that language, but please clarify if I missed it. Currently, there are no sanctioned or unsanctioned sites. If the encampments are complying with the protocol, they are permitted to be on City property.

In the event that we arrive onsite on Friday morning to find a tent or individuals in the middle of the site where we intend to set up our event, what do you propose we do? You would need to adjust your site plan accordingly.

Typically, I kindly ask picnicers who have not rented the space to move so as not to get harmed in the installation of tents, etc. But do we have the same ownership rights in this situation? You can ask folks to move, but if they choose not to, you'll have to adjust your site plan accordingly.

I realize we are speaking in hypotheticals at the moment, but we want to be prepared for any situation that may occur.

Hello all.

I am writing each of you today to share my experience and concerns during a run yesterday along the Bruce Trail just south of the Escarpment Rail Trail. I recently moved into the Delta neighborhood (from McMaster University area) and have been a resident of Hamilton for most of my life. I regularly enjoy the natural beauty that Hamilton has to offer and enjoy sharing these experiences with my young children (7 years old and 4 years old). We regularly go for hikes on the weekends, usually sticking to areas such as the Bruce Trail because in the past I see it as a safe place to explore the beauty of nature. As I am new to the Delta neighborhood, yesterday I started exploring the area shown below (clouded in red) by myself (thankfully) on a run after work. I was completely appalled from what I saw along the short few KM's during my run.


At first sight entering the space it seemed like a typical beautiful and safe section of the Bruce Trail, but once I entered, I realized that this is NOT a safe place to bring my children (or even myself for that matter). Within 5 minutes of entering the trail, I witnessed a disheveled couple having sexual intercourse on the trail, there were dozens of very large piles of debris, tents, mattresses, broken glass, garbage bags scattered everywhere, abandoned homeless encampments, and the list goes on. This was not in once isolated place, but scattered along a few KM stretch of the trail. It is a complete disgrace to the City of Hamilton and its residents who simply want to enjoy the outdoors.

I am writing to each of you, mainly because I am not certain who's ward this areas falls in, but I hope I have included the appropriate councilor, if not please forward this message. As a constituent of Ward 4, I am expecting a response back from Tammy Hwang with a plan of action on how this will be addressed.

I encourage each of you to visit this section of the Bruce Trail and ask yourself a few questions:

- 1) Is this a place I am proud to represent?
- 2) Is this a place I feel safe?
- 3) Is this a place I would bring my children?

I do understand that this is a complex issue and that Hamilton is facing a crisis dealing with the homeless population. I am sympathetic to the situation but there needs to be action taken. Simply turning a blind eye and doing NOTHING while areas of the city deteriorate to an unusable state is simply unacceptable. I am looking for some leadership and action from the people that have been elected to represent this fine city and its constituents.

Good afternoon,

In response to this inquiry, staff from Parks, MLE and Housing have reviewed the situation. Unfortunately without a consolidated encampment response team in place, it isn't always obvious who to bring together to address concerns raised. Each of us (Parks, MLE, Housing) have a role, so we have coordinated, and I'm responding on behalf of everyone. In the absence of the Encampment Response team, we have determined a temporary process that we will implement for this scenario.

Staff from Housing will attend the site (my understanding is that this is occurring today), and speak with the individuals staying at Shamrock Park. The individuals will be encouraged to pick up the litter, needles and other items and place them at a designated location using safe disposal methods particularly for the biohazard and glass. If they are willing do to this pick up, Parks can then pick up the litter and safety dispose of it.

The intent would be to facilitate the clean up of the debris and litter, and not a removal of the encampment. Timing of this work has yet to be confirmed.

Please be aware that the reports on Encampments will be discussed at the February 1, 2023 GIC and there will hopefully be clarity on how to manage these situations and requests going forward.

There is an obscene amount of garbage all throughout the downtown area.

I wish this was an exaggeration, but 95% of the neighborhoods; homes, alleyways, parks, trails, railway tracks, businesses, storefronts etc. etc. are plastered in garbage.

A common scene are signs that say, "no dumping" or "fines for illegal dumping" and beside it is exactly that. (See photo attached for visual example).

I typically send you a list of addresses, including google map locations to help.

This has resulted in the spot eventually being dealt with but then immediately littered again.

As an avid cyclist and dog walker, I've seen that majority of the public parks are a serious health hazard, covered with fecal matter, drugs, drug paraphernalia, rotten food, sharp house wares, sharp car parts, cigarettes by the millions and the list of items goes on. Parks where service trucks for the homeless go to support those in need are handing prepackaged, Styrofoam and plastic containers. Unfortunately, many of which aren't even eaten just picked through and thrown on the ground. I only know this because I often go clean up on my own and its always prominent in the parks post truck visit.

There are mounds of garbage bags, illegally dumped throughout the streets, sidewalks, parks, even in front of people's own properties.

Many rental properties or homes are full of hoarded garbage and not taken care of, resulting in overgrown yards, bringing insect infestations, and a place for more garbage to hide.

Are fines not being enforced?

It's a health concern to leave your home with the state its currently in, unable to walk in certain areas as there is so much broken glass and trash everywhere. Blowing garbage on windy days. Cigarette butt piles that animals and sometimes children mistake for food.

I understand the world is a complete dumpster fire right now, and this is a much bigger issue i.e., mental disorders, social barriers, packaging mandates, manufacturers and so on. But as a city, and even among each neighborhood, what is being done to manage this specific issue?

As I continue to do everything I can to help the issue in my own neighborhood,

I must ask the people in charge what's the plan moving forward? Is there an opportunity to implement the following?

- Increased staffing for garbage clean ups?
- Proper garbage receptacles both on streets and for homes (with lids so garbage doesn't blow everywhere)?
- Enforcement of ticketing?
- In addition to orphan flower beds planting, can the streets, walkways, trails, and parks also be cleaned?

Looking forward to hearing from you on these questions / concerns.





AFFIDAVIT OF WESLEY LOY

- I, WESLEY LOY, of the City of Hamilton in the Province of Ontario, MAKE OATH AND SAY:
 - 1. I am a data and records coordinator employed by the Hamilton Paramedic Service ("HPS"). As such, I have knowledge of the matters contained in this affidavit. Where I have relied on information that I have obtained from others, I have stated the source of the information and believe it to be true.
 - 2. HPS collects data on all emergency dispatches in the City of Hamilton (the "City") over the course of each year. The sources of HPS's emergency dispatch data are twofold. First, HPS gathers its data from the Ambulance Dispatch Reporting System ("ADRS"), which is managed by the Ministry of Health. Second, HPS gathers data from electronic patient care records ("EPCRs"), which are electronic records stored on an InterDev Technologies software program.
 - 3. The ADRS is an electronic reporting system where ambulance dispatchers input information received from individuals who call in to request an emergency dispatch. The

information inputted into the ADRS includes, among other things, the date and time that an emergency dispatch is requested, the location of the patient, and the reason for the dispatch. ADRS is used each time that an individual calls to request an emergency dispatch.

- 4. EPCRs are electronic forms that are filled out by the responding paramedics to create a record of the emergency dispatch. EPCRs include, among other things, the date and time of an ambulance's dispatch, the names of the paramedics who were dispatched, any notes related to the paramedics' assessment of the patient, the patient's problems as determined by the paramedic, the patient's medical history, and what procedures were followed by the paramedics during the emergency response.
- 5. The data collected from ADRS and EPCRs (the "Data") can be used to analyze the number of emergency dispatches City-wide and the reasons for those dispatches. Likewise, the Data can be used to pinpoint the number of emergency dispatches to a particular geographical area and the reasons for those dispatches.
- 6. The Data can also be used to track the number of emergency dispatches over a given period of time. Doing so can assist HPS in tracking increases or decreases in its emergency responses throughout the City or at particular locations.
- 7. I have reviewed the 2020 and 2021 Data as it pertains to the entire City and to seven specific geographic areas in which I understand the main encampments have been located during this time (collectively the "Encampment Areas").
- 8. These encampments and their locations are:
 - a) Central Park

- b) Beasley Park
- c) Strachan between Bay Street and James Street
- d) JC Beemer and Tweedsmuir Park
- e) Woodlands Park
- f) Claremont Access
- g) Kay Drage Park

Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit** "A" to this my Affidavit is a chart summarizing the location criteria used to identify the above-noted encampment locations.

- 9. I have also reviewed the 2020 and 2021 data as it pertains to the location near John and Rebecca Streets, where an encampment has been situated; however the number of dispatches for the John and Rebecca area reflects all dispatches to assist a person with no fixed address whether or not that person resides in the encampment located at John and Rebecca. Based on the data available, it is not possible to differentiate between people who reside in the encampments as opposed to people with no fixed address who happen to be in the area when they require assistance.
- 10. In reviewing this data, I have made observations about the rate of emergency dispatches to the Encampment Areas and the reasons that were identified for those emergency dispatches.
- 11. From October 1, 2020 to August 31, 2021 there were a total of 87 dispatches to the Encampment Areas, plus a further 158 dispatches to the John and Rebecca area. The 87 dispatches to the Encampment Areas reflect dispatches where HPS was requested to assist an encampment resident. The 158 dispatches to the John and Rebecca area,

as noted above, are not definitively linked to a person living in the encampment there. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit** "B" to this my Affidavit are two charts summarizing the dispatches to the Encampment Areas and to the John and Rebecca area, by number and by percentage. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit** "C" to this my Affidavit is a list of the details of each dispatch call that is summarized in the charts located in Exhibit "B."

- 12. The frequency of dispatches of HPS to Encampment Areas has increased since May of 2021. The most recent month for which I have reviewed data, August 2021, is also the month with the highest number of HPS responses, being 22; compared to 9 dispatches in the first month for which I have reviewed data, being October 2020. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "D"** to this my Affidavit are a chart and a line graph summarizing the number of HPS dispatches by month to Encampment Areas from October 2020 through August 2021.
- 13. The frequency of dispatches of HPS to Encampment Areas has varied, both as compared to those areas in previous years, and to the City overall within the same time frame. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit** "E" to this my Affidavit is a chart summarizing the percentage change in the number of HPS dispatches to Encampment Areas from October 2016 through August 2021.

Patients' Primary Problems

14. As indicated above, EPCRs will list the patient's problems based on the paramedics' assessment. Typically, a paramedic will report the patient's three top medical issues. In

my analysis, I have considered the primary (i.e. first on the list) patient problem reported by the paramedic for each patient.

- 15. From October 1, 2020 to August 31, 2021, the top three types of primary problems in all of the Encampment Areas, collectively, were: (i) opioid overdose suspected (18%); (ii) trauma/injury (16%); and (iii) drug/alcohol overdose (13%). Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit** "**F**" are two charts that I prepared using the Data, which depict the percentage breakdown within the top 10 different primary problems responded to in the Encampment Areas between October 1, 2020 and August 31, 2021.
- 16. Regarding the John and Rebecca area, the top three types of primary problems were (i) opioid overdose suspected (38%), (ii) drug/alcohol overdose (33%), and (iii) altered level of consciousness (9%) Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "G"** are two charts that I prepared using the Data, which depict the percentage breakdown of the top 10 different primary problems responded to in the John and Rebecca area between October 1, 2020 and August 31, 2021.
- 17. Another framework within which to review the data regarding the primary problems of patients is by the percentage breakdown of all of the primary problems reported. For the primary problems reported among all of the Encampment Areas between October 1, 2020 and August 31, 2021, the top three categories are (i) Endocrine/Toxological (34%), (ii) Musculoskeletal-Trauma (24%), and (iii) General and Minor (21%). Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "H"** are two charts that I prepared using the Data, which depict the overall percentage of different primary problems responded to in the Encampment Areas between October 1, 2020 and August 31, 2021.

18. Regarding the percentage breakdown of all of the primary problems reported in the John and Rebecca area. between October 1, 2020 and August 31, 2021, the top three categories are (i) Endocrine/Toxological (73%), (ii) Neurological (17%), and (iii) Musculoskeletal-Trauma (4%). Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "I"** are two charts that I prepared using the Data, which depict the overall percentage of different primary problems responded to in the John and Rebecca area between October 1, 2020 and August 31, 2021.

AFFIDAVIT OF WESLEY LOY

- I, Wesley Loy, of the City of Hamilton, in the Province of Ontario, AFFIRM:
- I am a data and records coordinator employed by the Hamilton Paramedic Service ("HPS"). As such, I have knowledge of the matters contained in this affidavit.
 Where I have relied on information that I have obtained from others, I have stated the source of the information and believe it to be true.
- I make this affidavit as a supplement and update to my affidavit affirmed October
 7, 2021.
- I have reviewed the Ambulance Dispatch Reporting System ("ADRS") and electronic patient care records ("EPCR") data from January 2023 through June 30,
 2024 as it pertains to the entire City and to fourteen specified geographic areas in

which I understand encampments have been most consistently located during this time (collectively the "Updated Encampment Areas").

- 4. These locations are:
 - (a) Bayfront Park/Waterfront Trail
 - (b) Cathedral Dog Park
 - (c) Fairfield Park
 - (d) Beasley Park
 - (e) City Hall/Whitehern Historic House & Garden
 - (f) Wellington Park
 - (g) Gage Park
 - (h) Eastwood Park
 - (i) Woodlands Park
 - (j) Myrtle Park
 - (k) J.C. Beemer Park
 - (I) John and Rebecca Streets
 - (m) The Bruce trail access near the intersection of Wentworth Street South and Charlton Avenue East
 - (n) Barton Street West and Tiffany Street

Attached hereto and marked as Exhibit "A" to this my Affidavit is a chart

summarizing the location criteria used to identify the above-noted locations.

- 5. As with my October 8, 2021 Affidavit, the John and Rebecca area is also an area where I am aware that homelessness-serving supports are located. The number of dispatches for the John and Rebecca area reflects all dispatches to assist a person with no fixed address whether or not that person resides in an encampment located at John and Rebecca. Based on the data available, it is not possible to differentiate between people who reside in an encampment as opposed to people with no fixed address who happen to be in the area when they require assistance.
- 6. The same applies for the City Hall/Whitehern Historic House & Garden area: this location is across the street from the YWCA which I am aware provides homelessness-serving supports. Again, the data do not permit differentiation between people who live in an encampment there, as opposed to people with no fixed address who happen to be in the area when they require assistance.
- 7. In reviewing this data, I have made observations about the rate of emergency dispatches to the Updated Encampment Areas and the reasons that were identified for those emergency dispatches.
- 8. From January 2024 through June 2024, there were a total of 378 dispatches to the Updated Encampment Areas, of which 99 were to the City Hall/Whitehern area and 5 were dispatches to the John and Rebecca area. The 274 dispatches to the Updated Encampment Areas reflect dispatches where HPS was requested to assist an encampment resident. The 104 dispatches to the City Hall/Whitehern and

John and Rebecca areas, as noted above, are not definitively linked to a person living in the encampment there. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit** "B" to this my Affidavit are two charts summarizing the dispatches to the Encampment Areas and to the John and Rebecca area, by number and by percentage. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit** "C" to this my Affidavit is a list of the details of each dispatch call that is summarized in the charts located in **Exhibit** "B."

- 9. The frequency of dispatches to the Updated Encampment Areas has fluctuated, although each month in 2024 to date has had a higher number of dispatches to the Updated Encampment Areas than the same month in 2023 (2 in January 2023 vs 22 in January 2024; 6 in February 2023 vs 16 in February 2024; 8 in March 2023 vs 27 in March 2024; 12 in April 2023 vs 19 in April 2024; 27 in May 2023 vs 34 in May 2024; and 26 in June 202 vs 42 in June 2024). Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "D"** to this my Affidavit are a chart and a line graph summarizing the number of HPS dispatches by month to Encampment Areas from January 2023 to June 2024.
- 10. Regarding the patients' primary problems as indicated on the EPCRs, I have again considered the primary (i.e. first on the list) patient problem reported by the paramedic for each patient.
- 11. From January 2023 through June 2024, the top three types of primary problems in all of the Updated Encampment Areas, collectively, were: (i) opioid overdose suspected (7%); (ii) trauma/injury (7%); and (iii) musculoskeletal (4%). Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "E"** are three charts that I prepared using the Data,

which depict the percentage breakdown within the top 10 different primary problems responded to in the Updated Encampment Areas between January 1, 2023 and June 30, 2024.

12. Another framework within which to review the data regarding the primary problems of patients is the percentage breakdown by medical category. For the primary problems reported among all of the Updated Encampment Areas between January 1, 2023 and June 30, 2024, the top three medical categories are (i) Endocrine/Toxicological (26%), (ii) General and Minor (25%); and (iii) Neurological (24%). Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit "F"** are two charts that I prepared using the Data, which depict the overall percentage of different primary problems responded to in the Updated Encampment Areas between January 1, 2023 and June 30, 2024.

TOP 10 PRIMARY PROBLEMS - SELECTED CITY LOCATIONS, 2023/2024



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AFFIDAVIT OF SHAWN MACKEIGAN, DIRECTOR OF MEN'S SERVICES, MISSION SERVICES (SWORN OCTOBER 6, 2021)

I, SHAWN MACKEIGAN, of the City of Hamilton in the Province of Ontario, MAKE OATH AND SAY:

1. I am the Director of Men's Services at Mission Services of Hamilton ("Mission Services"). I have been in my current position for 5 years. Previously, I worked in social services with the City of Brantford, beginning in 2007. Mission Services is a registered charity and multi-service agency that pursues the goal of ending poverty. In my role as Director, Men's Services, among other things, I oversee the provision of shelter services to homeless men and couples in the City of Hamilton. As such I have knowledge of the matters set out in this my affidavit. Where I rely on the information of others, I state the source of that information and verily believe it to be true.

Hotel Spaces

2. In or about mid to late March, 2020, Mission Services began to explore options for socially distanced spaces for the homeless in the City of Hamilton. We wanted to ensure that adequate spacing in our congregate living spaces could be observed, and we determined that adding hotel spaces to be a good option for clients who were not medically vulnerable (in terms of physical as well as mental health, including addiction status) and who could self-isolate, if necessary. This generally led to lower acuity clients being considered more appropriate for hotel placements at first, and helped to ensure that higher acuity clients, including those with severe or unstable substance abuse disorders, had access to more spaces and resources at shelter sites. However, the situation has changed over time and, as more services became available at the hotels, many higher acuity clients have been served at hotel sites.

- 3. In April, 2020, Mission Services began operating 35 rooms at a hotel in East Hamilton for single men and couples—so, at maximum, 70 individuals. Not all of our rooms have been occupied by couples, but we typically had more than 35 individuals in our hotel spaces on any given night.
- 4. While the East Hamilton hotel is owned and operated as a traditional fee for service hotel by a private market partner, these 35 rooms were operated as an extension of Mission Services, offering essentially the same emergency shelter services and supports, and was intended to have similarly few barriers to access.
- 5. In early September, 2020, Mission Services moved its operations to a Downtown Stoney Creek hotel. At that location, we have access to four floors, with rooms available, that could house a maximum of 162 individuals. This number is dependent on whether the rooms are occupied by couples or single individuals.
- 6. The hotel rooms provide a private space for each client, with a locking door and washroom.

 Hotel cleaning staff does the daily cleaning work, though Mission Services provides supplies.
- 7. Mission Services is housing-centred and housing-focused. Traditionally, emergency shelter services focused on providing food and a bed ('three hots and a cot'). Our priorities are different today, and are based on the 'Housing First' philosophy, which is supported by the academic literature and a track record of positive outcomes across North America.
- 8. The Housing First philosophy has no readiness or training requirements before housing can be accessed by our clients; it is based around the belief that everyone can be housed, and it acknowledges that homelessness causes new issues and exacerbates existing issues—in terms of physical and mental illnesses, including drug addiction—in the individuals experiencing it, whereas housing opportunities, with long-term supports (including social assistance) once in housing, leads to demonstrable improvements in physical and mental health, as well as economic status.

- 9. Mission Services serves many highly acute persons, and our programs are in tune with the needs of such clients. We work with our clients on their own terms, in individualized ways. We ask only that our clients engage with us in the process of ending their episodes of homelessness, and bring reasonable expectations to that process. We have succeeded in placing many highly acute persons in housing, and do so regularly; this includes clients who were previously homeless for lengthy periods.
- 10. There is not a waitlist for the housing opportunities we have available in the City of Hamilton. We continue to have housing opportunities available and are able to place clients in housing right now, today. The opportunities currently available include housing loss prevention and homelessness diversion assistance, emergency shelter beds for men and women, hotel options for men, women, couples & families, temporary emergency shelter spaces, and permanent housing placements in the private market. Mission Services' Housing First program has helped 162 housing placements from Housing Up between April 2020 and October 5, 2021.
- 11. With the Housing First philosophy in mind, all clients accessing our services at the hotel sites have been supported by on-site case management staff.

Encampments—Competing Philosophies

12. An older philosophy has been involved in the creation of encampments. This philosophy used to be called "Housing Readiness". This philosophy is considered discredited in the social services field and was abandoned in North America in the 1990s. Housing Readiness was principally concerned with lifeskills training (employment, cooking, cleaning, etc.), and was based on a belief that these skills must be present before a housing placement would be successful. The Housing Readiness philosophy was ultimately abandoned in favour of the Housing First philosophy, because it became apparent after Housing Readiness had been put into practice for some time that Housing Readiness in fact perpetuates and worsens homelessness—by making housing less likely to be

accessed at a given time by a given individual, it actually contributes to the underlying issues, i.e. physical and mental illnesses and drug addiction, that led to them being homeless in the first place.

- 13. In sum, Housing First was born out of a recognition that homelessness is bad for you. By getting our clients into housing as quickly as possible, we can work at resolving their often difficult underlying issues now rather than leaving them to be dealt with later.
- 14. The problem is that, by prolonging episodes of homelessness, the Housing Readiness philosophy makes encampments more likely to exist and for longer periods. Organizations such as HAMSMaRT and Keeping Six, who work with encampment occupants—without any oversight, standards or regulations—can thereby actually undermine the available housing options and the long-term health and wellbeing of encampment occupants, by telling them that they are `not yet ready' to be housed, that they need to learn lifeskills first, or that they will be given priority for future housing by staying in encampments.

Service Restrictions and Discharges From Hotel

- 15. Our hotel partners employ a robust camera surveillance system at their buildings and utilize this system in and around their premises to ensure staff, guest, and property safety.
- 16. While accessing our services at the hotel sites, our clients have been expected to abide by the same expectations as they would at our shelter sites.
- 17. For example, Mission Services' staff conduct periodic room checks. This has a wellness aspect, allowing us to identify concerns and prevent harm (we have not had a single death due to overdose or otherwise at our hotel sites), and an efficiency aspect, allowing us to ensure our rooms are being used. An unexplained absence from the hotel may result in a room being reassigned.
- 18. Similarly, as in Mission Services' shelters, individuals accessing the hotel sites are not prohibited from using drugs, but it is expected that they will not do so in their rooms or elsewhere on

- site. Cigarette and marijuana smoking inside of rooms is strictly prohibited by the hotel and there are designated areas and signage directing all guests to where these activities can take place outside of the hotel building. Using drugs that do not require burning of substances i.e.: IV drugs, can be used in the privacy of the hotel room so long as the guests are responsible and ensure that paraphernalia is disposed of using the available `sharps containers'.
- 19. Breaches of expectations can lead to discharge from the hotels. This would result in a referral to another shelter site in the City of Hamilton; we do not discharge clients to the street.
- 20. Between April 2020 and October 6, 2021, we have had 469 non-voluntary hotel discharges (i.e. this figure does not include the 59 of our hotel clients who we have placed in housing since the pandemic began). 110 of these discharges were due to domestic issues (as we provide services to couples, this includes disputes of all kinds as well as domestic abuse). A further 294 were for non-compliance with expectations, i.e. verbal abuse of staff, damage to rooms, repeatedly bringing guests back to rooms, and other safety concerns, i.e. drug activity, sex work and various forms of mischief (attempts to break in to vehicles, propping open emergency doors, attempts to enter garbage containers). While another 65 were involuntary discharges as they were referred to another shelter.
- 21. Between April 2020 and October 6, 2021, we had 144 service restrictions. These are instances where an individual was restricted and does not necessarily reflect 'unique individuals'. It is possible for people to be restricted and subsequently return at some point after the restriction period ended or the individual circumstances changed.
- 22. Between April 2020 and October 6, 2021, there were 82 self-discharges.
- 23. Between April 2020 and October 6, 2021, 59 individuals were housed.
- 24. There have been very few individuals who have been truly 'restricted from service' at our hotel sites. Often times, a discharge is a sufficient natural consequence for unacceptable behaviours

exhibited while accessing service. We are always open to exploring referrals for clients who have previously accessed our services and have been discharged. City-wide discussions take place about this issue quite often, and we have had previous clients return after being discharged. This review assumes that the reasons for discharge have been adequately explored and understood by the client and that Mission Services staff, the referral team at the City of Hamilton and our referring partners are satisfied that behaviours or issues have been addressed and that a change in behaviour is a reasonable expectation.

COVID-19 Protocols

- 25. At our hotel sites, we have conducted multiple COVID-19 screenings each day. If a screening is not passed, as in the case noted above, the result is self-isolation and testing.
- 26. Personal Protective Equipment (masks, gowns, shields, gloves, etc.) and related training has been provided to all Mission Services staff working at the hotel sites.
- 27. Masks are provided to our clients, as well.
- 28. Vaccinations are readily available to clients who are interested in obtaining them.
- 29. Currently, roughly 70% of the staff at our organization have received two doses of the COVID-19 vaccine. We anticipated that this number will increase in coming months.
- 30. I make this affidavit in order to clarify and explain the background of and services provided by Mission Services in the City of Hamilton and for no other or improper purpose.

AFFIDAVIT OF OLIVIA MANCINI (affirmed October 4, 2021)

- I, Olivia Mancini of the City of Hamilton, in the Province of Ontario AFFIRM AND SAY:
 - 1. I have personal knowledge with respect to the facts set out below about the emergency shelter system. Where information is not based on my personal knowledge, it is based upon information provided by other professionals, which I believe to be credible and true.
 - 2. I worked at the Salvation Army Booth Centre (an emergency shelter for men) for six years as a case manager. In this role I supported men experiencing homelessness with reaching their housing goals, as well as other goals related, but not limited to substance use, mental health, financial assistance, legal concerns, etc.
 - 3. I also worked at Carol Anne's Place (an overnight drop in space for women) as an Addiction Attendant. In this role I supported women experiencing homelessness with getting into detox or shelter (if that was their goal) and monitored women experiencing withdrawal symptoms.

- I am a volunteer with Keeping Six a community-based organization, founded in 2018 at the height
 of the opioid crisis to defend the rights, dignity and humanity of people who use drugs. I write this
 affidavit on behalf of Keeping Six.
- 5. I obtained a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology with a minor in Sociology in 2014 from Brock University, followed by a Concurrent Disorders Diploma from Mohawk College in 2015. I recently completed a Bachelor of Social Work in 2020 from McMaster University, and I am currently a Master of Social Work Critical Leadership Candidate at McMaster University.

Carol Anne's Place

- 6. Carol Anne's Place is not a shelter, it is an overflow drop in space, and has a capacity for 15 women, but typically see upwards of 25 women a night. During every shift we would call around to the women's shelters and they are always at capacity. It is more challenging to find shelter space for a single woman without children in her care as most shelters are for women with children fleeing domestic violence. Most women accessing Carol Anne's place are service restricted from the women's shelters due to complex mental health and substance use.
- 7. The women's shelters have a "do not admit list." For example, one woman has not been allowed to access shelter since 2018 for being removed by police once. There are significantly less shelter beds for women in the city compared to men's shelter. Women's clothing, cellphone, and other belongings were often stolen during the night. Carol's Anne's place is considered the "last stop" for women in the city as there is nowhere else to go if they cannot access Carol Anne's place. Benefits of Carol Anne's place is that it is low barrier and will only service restrict women for 24-48 hours maximum. They also provide harm reduction supplies, but they encourage women to not use on the property.

Salvation Army Booth Centre Bed Capacity

8. This has a capacity for 82 men, and 10 emergency overflow spaces. When the first lockdown took place, capacity went down to approximately 50 beds. There are dorm style beds that accommodates 11-3 men per dorm with a half wall built between them. There are two double rooms split by a divider and approximately 40 single rooms. The dorm beds are for everyone, and single rooms are reserved for clients who pose the least amount of risk first. If there are concerns with substance use

and possible overdose, clients will be placed into a dorm room. If none are available, client will be booked into ideally a double room, if not then a single room with the understanding that they will eb moved to a dorm bed when available.

9. When the pandemic hit, all the shelters reduced their bed capacity, and a temporary ad-hoc shelter was opened at First Ontario Centre. This did not increase bed capacity, it made up for the decrease in beds at the other shelters. Clients were being service restricted for two days for missing curfew at First Ontario in the middle of a pandemic. The expectation to return for 10pm curfew is difficult for people living on the streets that may not have concept of time, persistent mental health concerns, and substance use. During the pandemic Salvation Army had two common rooms available for clients to spend time in during the daytime as other essential services that clients would typically use were closed (shopping malfs, coffee shops). Two common rooms were not enough for 82 people to maintain social distancing, so many people were still left outside during the daytime with nowhere to go.

Salvation Army Booth Centre Book in times/curfew

- 10. Shelter staff are available to clients 24/7. Clients can book in between the hours of 9am to 4pm daily. Curfew is at 10pm and if you are not in your bed then you are discharged, and your bed is given to someone else. If clients miss the 10pm curfew, they can return to book in after midnight if a space is available and they can return for their belongings the following day between 6pm-10pm. There are three additional bed checks between the hours of 11pm-4am. You can miss 1/3 of these bed checks and are welcomed back into your bed. If you miss 2/3 or 3/3 you are welcomed back into your bed until 8am, but you are not allowed to have breakfast. You must take your belongings and go, and if you need a bed for the following night, you must wait until 6pm. The logic is based on a standpoint of "if you want a bed, you will be in your bed all night." It does not take into consideration substance use and mental health.
- 11. The dorms are closed every day from 8am-6pm, so there is nowhere to sleep during the daytime. This can be particularly challenging for clients who work night shift as they will not be accommodated. Also, as an unhoused person you are in crisis and focused on surviving, so it can be quite difficult to remember all of the different rules and times. If the shelter is full, you are not allowed to wait for a bed to become available, staff will call the other shelters in the city, and then inform client of what is available. If all shelters are full then you are turned away to the street and

provided information on potential places to find food as meals are only for shelter residents. If you are service restricted (not allowed to access shelter due to behaviours, such as mental health, substance use) from all three men's shelters, you are turned away to the street, this is a very common practice.

12. The city's narrative that there are shelter beds available for everyone is false. Shelter beds are consistently at capacity nightly, and this will continue into the cold winter months. The city's narrative that there are no clients who are service restricted shelter wide is also false. I can think of several clients who are currently service restricted from all three men's shelters.

Salvation Army Booth Centre Atmosphere

- 13. The atmosphere is generally chaotic. The afternoon case managers are required to do many tasks outside of the role of case manager. The case managers must cover three breaks for front desk, attend one hour dinner to help kitchen staff feel safe with clients, unlock all the dorms (as they are locked during the daytime), obtain client belongings from storage after 6pm as requested by clients, locking the TV room and laundry room, doing hourly rounds throughout the building to ensure clients are alive and safe. On top of that there is an expectation to house 20 clients per month with an expectation of over 10 meaningful engagements with clients, such as helping a client secure income, search for housing, call landlords, set up housing views, secure payments for rent, and complete housing applications. It is easy to exceed over 10 meaningful engagements a day, but on average only 25% of these engagements are about housing and the remainder is crisis management. Often clients return to the shelter under the influence of an unknown substance and require supervision, clients will engage in altercations, females will present on site and refuse to leave, service restricted clients who are not allowed to be in the building will present and refuse to leave, clients have medical emergencies (mostly overdoses), and mental health crisis (i.e., psychosis hearing or seeing things that are not there).
- 14. The City of Hamilton still currently pays shelters the same amount per year to run a shelter, but since the opioid epidemic began, the demands on staff are far greater and staff are pulled away from routine duties regularly. The response from the City is threatening removal of funding if housing stats aren't at expectation.

Salvation Army Booth Centre Theft

15. When new clients present staff make sure they understand that under no circumstance do you leave belongings unattended, or they will be stolen. Clients are informed to lock up their belongings in the locker provided. Many clients do not have a lock or money to purchase a lock, in this case we encourage clients to keep any valuables in their pockets. Clients fall asleep regularly with their phone on their pillow thinking it will be safe, and it will be stolen by morning. This proves difficult for those who understand limited English, or seniors, as they tend to fall victim to theft at a higher rate. Staff on site cannot review cameras in the moment and by the time management reviews the cameras, the belongings are long gone. If the client who stole the belongings can be identified on camera, they will be service restricted for a period of time. It is not uncommon for previous clients to sneak into building and search through the dorms and steal items. For example, a client who had been no trespassed for a year walked into the building and stole a client's laptop out of his single room while he was in the washroom. Also, clients are not allowed to bring their bikes into the building, but if they lock their bike up outside it will get stolen. Bikes are stolen on a regular basis out front of the Salvation Army. Client's belongings are often the only possessions they have, and for their belongings to get stolen it can be very upsetting and be a barrier to accessing shelter in the future due to fear of theft. For clients who do not return to their shelter bed for the night, their belongings are packed and labelled and put into storage. When the client returns for their belongings, more often than not clients become upset and state that some of their belongings are missing. I have often found clients missing items because their belongings were not labeled properly by housekeeping staff. This was an ongoing issue of mislabelling belongings. Staff's response is "we are not responsible for lost or stolen belongings" and there is nothing staff can do about the missing items. The shelter also only stores belongings for 48 hours and then the belongings are disposed of. Client's medications are also disposed of after 72 hours. This can cause a lot of unnecessary issues for clients as they are often unable to get a refill of their medications until the next refill date. Some clients will opt to keep their medications on them to avoid this issue, but then if they are caught with their medications in the shelter, they will be service restricted for a period of time.

Salvation Army Booth Centre Safety Concerns

16. Clients experience safety concerns, verbal threats, and physical violence on a regular basis in the shelter. I have personally witnessed a physical altercation where a client's leg was broken. Another client was brutally assaulted in the washroom, and as a result I had to attend court with my colleague. There was a 12-person altercation in the parking lot where a belt was used as a weapon. One client chased another client with a hammer. One client brutally assaulted someone, to the point that he was in a coma and was charged with attempted murder. Staff are also susceptible to safety concerns, verbal threats, and physical violence. A client punched the side mirror off my car. Another client attempted to get into my vehicle after work and I later found out he was planning to murder me by strangulation. A handful of security guards have been physically assaulted by clients. A client attempted to punch me in the face, but security was able to intervene. Since the pandemic, there has been an increase in violence. For example, a client's face was macheted numerous times at Salvation Army and a client was murdered outside of Mission Services. These are just a few examples of the violence within the shelter system.

Salvation Army Booth Centre Service Restrictions

17. Service restriction is the practice of limiting or denying access to emergency shelter for a set period of time. Shelter staff may impose service restrictions for using substances, possession of illicit drugs or harm reduction supplies, mental health, or violating shelter policies. Service restrictions vary in length. A staff member can only service restrict for 24 to 48 hours pending management review. Management will then review the service restriction and implement an extension. Service restrictions can be from 24 hours to sometimes months and years. Typically, service restrictions are extended if it is a repeat behaviour. At times this is inappropriate as clients continue to be punished for incidences that may have happened a few years ago that they were already punished for, but because it is a repeat behaviour the service restriction gets extended for a longer period of time. Service restrictions also depend on the staff's personal values and beliefs, particularly around engaging in substance use. For example, a client overdosed in the washroom and was service restricted for 6 months. This sends the client a message that they will be punished for using substances in the shelter and encourages using substances alone or hiding their substance use due to fear of criminalization. Personally, I would rather clients use inside the shelter where there is staff to save them than to use in a back alleyway because they were service restricted for overdosing in the shelter. Another client attempted suicide by hanging, and he was service restricted for one year. The reasoning behind this was he "traumatized" staff. I do not agree with service restrictions involving substance use or mental health as people are being punished for having an illness. The length of service restrictions is also inconsistent. For example, to demonstrate the inconsistency, three clients were service restricted for smoking in the building - one was for 24 hours, one was for 14 days, and one was for 3 months.

18. There are no clearly documented policies or procedures for service restrictions in the shelter system in Hamilton for a practice that ultimately causes harm and trauma to service users. Many clients will end up being service restricted from all three men's shelters for similar behaviours or issues. The service restrictions will not be lifted in these situations unless it is a cold alert (-16 degrees), the shelter with the least severe service restriction would have to take the client, however, there have been times where this was not the case. Sometimes when clients are service restricted shelter wide, we will refer them to another city, but during the pandemic shelters were not accepting clients from other cities, so an additional barrier to accessing shelter was put in place for those who have nowhere else to go.

COVID-19 outbreaks in shelter

19. When all three men's shelters were in outbreaks at the same time, there were zero indoor options for unhoused men. Numerous people were turned away to the streets. Many clients asked where they are supposed to go when all the shelters are in outbreaks, and we had no answer for them. It was absolutely gut-wrenching to turn people away to the street with no other options. The city did not provide alternative indoor options, despite having a year to prepare for outbreaks within the shelter system. Unhoused people were essentially left behind and not included in pandemic response plans. I found myself reaching out to medical professionals in the field to have them advocate for clients who had nowhere else to go. Some days we were able to find an indoor option, but most day's people were left to sleep on the streets. The hotel programs that were opened were only for women and couples. Single men were not allowed to go to the hotel as they were deemed "high risk." A few men were able to get into hotels during the outbreaks in all the men's shelters, but as soon as a shelter was out of outbreak all the men were discharged from hotel to the street. Staff did not even secure them beds at the shelters, so when these men attempted to find space, the shelter was already at capacity.

Salvation Army Booth Centre – Substance abuse and the changing landscape with Covid -19

20. Overdoses within the shelter have rapidly increased. Throughout the pandemic, overdoses have been occurring on almost a daily basis. At one point, there was seven overdoses in one day. During the outbreak, a temporary safe injection site was implemented at the Salvation Army to encourage people to stay indoors and stop the spread of the virus. The safe injection site quickly closed before

the outbreak was declared over, and a client who was accessing the space ended up dying of an overdose in his dorm bed. Many clients were overdosing off property across the street when First Ontario was open and around the corner on the stairs at the Philpot church. Clients would come into the shelter and ask staff for naloxone (opioid reversal drug) due to an overdose. Staff would respond in these situations. Staff were then directed by management to not respond to overdoses off property because if they are injured off the property, the shelter would not be liable. Staff were even threatened to be fired for leaving property while on shift. The way we responded to overdoses also changed during the pandemic. It was recommended to not do CPR because of the risk of transmission and staff would need to receive verbal confirmation that other staff were comfortable with the staff person doing CPR.

- 21. The pandemic has made the opioid epidemic worse due to closure of harm reduction services/reduction in hours/online services, social distancing and stay at home guidelines has increased the likelihood of people using alone, closure of borders has increased toxic drug supply, and the city's drug strategy was put on hold to respond to the pandemic, despite the opioid epidemic also being a public health emergency.
- 22. The staff to client ratio is not appropriate. Staff are not appropriately trained or equipped to respond to complex mental health issues (including violence and crisis) and responding to an insanely high number of overdoses. Responding to overdoses on a daily basis should not be normalized in shelters, it is traumatic. Safe spaces to use drugs inside the shelter would ultimately save lives, improve health and safety, reduce staff burnout, and allow case managers to do the job they were hired to do. Staff in shelters are underfunded and under resourced, we are doing the best we can with very limited resources. We help clients navigate complex systems and try to remove barriers, but we are often unable to meet the complex needs of clients.
- 23. Case management has been proven difficult to do amidst a pandemic. There has been an increase in violence, we have been managing an increase in overdoses, and increase in crisis intervention. Shelter staff have been more focused on keeping people alive and safe, and providing basic necessities such as food, hygiene, and a place to sleep. Closure of services, reduced hours, or programs moving online due to COVID-19 has left very limited indoor options for unhoused people.

24. Barriers that unhoused people are facing are long waitlists for addiction and mental health supports – they need access to immediate interventions. There is also a lack of affordable and supportive housing. This is a major gap as people with higher needs, need supports in place in order to successfully maintain housing. The vaccine passport is also a challenge for unhoused people as many do not have proof of vaccination and do not have photo ID. ID is often lost or stolen. Again, there is very limited indoor options for unhoused people to go to the bathroom or practice public health guidelines such as washing their hands. In general, shelters are understaffed, the staff are undertrained and underpaid, which leads to a high turnover rate, which leads to an even less stable environment for people in shelter.

AFFIDAVIT OF CORY MANNING

- I, Cory Manning, of the City of Hamilton, in the Province of Ontario, AFFIRM:
- 1. I am an employee of the City Hamilton as such I have knowledge of the matters set out in my affidavit. Where I rely on the information of others, I state the source of that information and verily believe it to be true.

Roles and Duties

- 2. Since June 2024, I have held the title of Superintendent of Parks District North of the Hamilton Parks and Cemeteries Section for the City of Hamilton. I have been employed with the City of Hamilton for approximately eighteen years in various roles within the Parks and Cemeteries Section or its predecessor. In terms of my recent roles, in approximately September 2021 I became the Superintendent of Parks District West. In May 2022 I also, as an added responsibility, headed the encampment team for the Parks and Cemeteries Section. I have continued to head the encampment team while continuing on as Superintendent of Parks District North. In each of these roles I report to Kara Bunn.
- 3. The encampment team is, generally, tasked with cleanup of encampment sites; whether cleaning sites that have been vacated or abandoned; or assisting with cleanliness and waste removal for sites that are still active. In May 2022, cleanup was performed by contractors during daytime hours, and Parks North staff after their normal hours, as additional duties. The supervisor, Joe Wade, oversaw this team. My role involved, primarily, managing complaints, along with Mr. Wade; attending meetings three times per week regarding coordinating cleanup; directing deployment of cleanups; and liaising with the Housing Focused Street Outreach Team ("HFSOT"), Housing, Municipal Law Enforcement ("MLE"), and Hamilton Police Service, as necessary, regarding new sites.
- 4. Following the enactment of the 2023 Encampment Protocol, Council approved one full-time supervisor and three full-time staff members within Parks solely dedicated to

encampment cleanup. As the head of the encampment team, my role remained essentially the same as described in the paragraph above.

- 5. I confirm that the "Standard Operating Procedure" referenced in the Second Supplementary Affidavit of Steve Hasselman directs how cleanup is performed, but does not direct when cleanup is performed.
- 6. The encampment team performs "regular cleanup" of known encampment sites on a routine basis, to assist with keeping existing encampments clean. This includes supplying encampment residents with garbage bags or asking them to pile their garbage or discarded items in a certain area for collection. We only take items that encampment residents have specifically indicated are garbage. The encampment team also performs cleanup in accordance with the 2023 Encampment Protocol, in accordance with the steps dictated in the Protocol. Encampment team members will also accompany Parks North staff to pre-engage with encampment residents (to give them advance notice) before staff perform park maintenance activity such as grass cutting.
- 7. Attached hereto as **Exhibit "A"** is a spreadsheet summarizing the daily cleanup at encampments from February 2023 through February 2024. Attached hereto as **Exhibit** "B" is a spreadsheet summarizing the daily cleanup at encampments from March 2024 to the first week of July, 2024.

Observations of Parks and Encampments

- 8. The Parks West district includes Ancaster, Flamborough and Dundas. I have observed very few encampments in this area and no significant issues relating to encampments in this area.
- 9. As current superintendent of Parks North, I observe that approximately 90-95% of encampments in the City appear to be located within the Parks North district.
- 10. Given my role as head of the encampments team, a large part of my day and my workload involves dealing with encampments: either responding to complaints regarding encampments or coordinating staff to respond to these complaints. I have reviewed the complaints appended to the Second Supplementary Affidavit of Steve Hasselman. I am aware of these types of complaints, which are the same as or similar to complaints that I have received and continue to receive working on the encampments team for the Parks and Cemeteries Section.
- 11. I and my staff make concerted efforts to develop and maintain positive relationships with the encamped residents at parks. We emphasize that we are not law enforcement and are not interacting with them in an enforcement capacity. I find that my staff and I generally enjoy a good rapport with people living in encampments.
- 12. I have observed that encampments are becoming more entrenched or permanent because they are permitted by the 2023 Encampment Protocol to remain in place longer. People living in encampments are adding to their spaces as they live there longer and become established. Many of them express that they see their encampment site as their

possession. Public complaints to Parks staff are also increasing along with the increase in the number of encampments and their perceived entrenchment.

AFFIDAVIT OF ROB MASTROIANNI

- I, ROB MASTROIANNI, of the City of Hamilton, in the Province of Ontario, MAKE OATH AND SAY:
- 1. I am an employee of the City Hamilton as such I have knowledge of the matters set out in my affidavit. Where I rely on the information of others, I state the source of that information and verily believe it to be true.
- 2. I am employed by the City of Hamilton as the Manager of the Residential Care Facilities Subsidy Program & Emergency Shelter Services within the Healthy & Safe Community Department of the City of Hamilton's Housing Services Division. My role includes, among other responsibilities, oversight of the City's Emergency Shelter Services and Housing Focused Street Outreach Team.

A Working Definition of Homelessness

3. It is difficult to precisely define homelessness. The Government of Canada, National Housing Strategy, provides the following definition adapted from the Canadian Definition of Homelessness developed by the Canadian Observatory of Homelessness: "Homelessness is the situation of an individual or family who does not have a permanent address or residence; the living situation of an individual or family who does not have stable, permanent, appropriate housing, or the immediate prospect, means and ability of acquiring it."

4. The Government of Canada, National Housing Strategy, provides the following definition of Indigenous homelessness:

"Indigenous Peoples who are in the state of having no home due to colonization, trauma and/or whose social, cultural, economic, and political conditions place them in poverty. Having no home includes: those who alternate between shelter and unsheltered, living on the street, couch surfing, using emergency shelters, living in unaffordable, inadequate, substandard and unsafe accommodations or living without the security of tenure; anyone regardless of age, released from facilities (such as hospitals, mental health and addiction treatment centers, prisons, transition houses), fleeing unsafe homes as a result of abuse in all its definitions, and any youth transitioning from all forms of care."

Addressing Homelessness in the City of Hamilton

Shelter Funding

- 5. The City acts as "system service manager" for homelessness response on behalf the Governments of Ontario and Canada. The City receives federal and provincial funding and contributes its own funding to address homelessness. The City must adhere to the funding guidelines of each funder, however, it is able to determine allocations based on need in the local context.
- 6. The City's Housing Services Division administers the funding for services and programs such as Emergency Shelters, the Housing Focused Street Outreach Team, Residential Care Facilities,

Housing Stability Benefits, Eviction Prevention programs, Rapid Rehousing programs and Intensive Case Management.

- 7. In many of the scenarios, the City disburses the funds through agreements with community partners. These agreements dictate expected target outcomes for each program and ongoing monitoring of success of the programs. The main agencies that administer emergency shelters in the City are The Good Sheppard, Mission Services and The Salvation Army.
- 8. The following are the 2020-2021 budget resources allocated for homelessness and emergency shelters available to the City:
 - a. The Federal Government Funding allotment for 2020-2021 through "Reaching Home" is \$5,718,428.
 - b. An additional \$1,000,000 was provided by the Federal Government for 2020-2021 through "Home for Good".
 - c. The Provincial Government Funding allotment for 2020-2021 through "Community Homelessness Prevention Initiative" ("CHPI") is \$19,455,174.
 - d. An additional \$2,954,960 comes from the City of Hamilton Levy for 2020.
 - e. In addition to the base funding described above, the City of Hamilton has received COVID-19 related funding to address the needs of the homelessness serving system during the pandemic. The COVID-19 related funding is as follows:
 - i. Reaching Home (Federal) \$2,651,550;
 - ii. Social Services Relief Fund (SSRF) (Provincial) \$6,880,800 (the City is currently applying for additional funding from the Province);

- iii. Community Relief Fund \$345,500.
- Algorithms are used to determine funding rates and block funding amounts based on number of beds, program spaces, etc.
- 10. A portion of the CHPI funding is budgeted for hotels. Hotels had traditionally been used to provide shelter for families or women with children when no space was available in a shelter. The City's 2020-2021 Fiscal Budget for hotels is \$800,000. Over last few years, hotel overflow expenses have steadily increased. Actual hotel expenses for 2019-2020 were approximately \$1.5M, well in excess of the available budget.
- 11. Since the start of COVID-19, in 2020, the City has spent and is committed to spend the following amounts on the shelter system:

12. While it was not possible to obtain updated figures in time for the preparation of this Affidavit, the budgetary commitments in 2021 are similar to those in 2020.

Providing Shelter for People Experiencing Homelessness

- 13. The above funding is used to provide a system consisting of various programs to deliver organized and professional services to people experiencing homelessness using best practices and key performance indicators. In Hamilton's homeless-serving system, various agencies work together through "Coordinated Access" to support those experiencing or approaching homelessness to find and maintain appropriate housing and supports.
- 14. Best practice informing homeless-serving systems identifies Coordinated Access, a client-centered, standardized process for intake, assessment, and referral to housing and other services, as a foundational element to ensure individuals are swiftly matched to the right-level of support based on their needs, preferences and available resources.
- 15. Through Coordinated Access, data is collected by all City funded shelters using a common software database known as Homeless Individuals and Families Information System ("HIFIS") to ensure that all individuals who are accessing services and who are willing to provide consent to collection of data are known to the system. In this way, the City can track the numbers of people accessing the system, their progress through the system and outcomes as well as provide information on unhoused persons when they move to different shelters in order to expedite the tailoring of services to them.
- 16. The City uses the data collected to advocate for additional funding, address pressures in specific service areas or needs, adjust programming to meet demand, and ensure a robust response with as many interventions and supports as possible.
- 17. The data is also used by the City to advocate for partnerships with other sectors (e.g. health care) for supports outside of the services provided through the homelessness/housing funding or system.

18. Case management for people experiencing homelessness is tailored to the level of support a person requires. The City uses Vulnerability Index - Service Prioritization Decision Assistance Tool ("VI-SPDAT"), a standard triage tool developed by OrgCode Consulting Inc. (one of the leaders in homelessness programming and development of best practices and tools for the homelessness-serving system) to assess the needs of unhoused people. VI-SPDAT has been largely adopted across the country as one of the most successful assessment tools.

19. A VI-SPDAT assessment identifies four general levels of service:

Acuity Level	Level of Support
0-3	No intervention as individuals typically self-resolve; information sharing on housing units, tenant rights and responsibilities, support with applications.
4-7	Rapid Rehousing Intervention; 6-9 months case management supports; monthly inhome visits, support stabilizing income, support to increase social capital within community. Staff/Client Ratio 1:20-25.
8-12	Intensive Case Management Intervention; 18-24 months support intensive case management supports; regular in-home visits, stabilize income, support maintaining housing unit, facilitate connection to health resources, promote wrap around supports and reconnection with broad community support networks. Staff/Client Ratio 1:15-20.
13+	Permanent Supportive Housing; Average of 3+ years of case management supports; ongoing support with navigating health system, support maintaining tenancy, reintegration into community support networks, development of wrap around supports; and, clinical services to address physical or mental health, intellectual disabilities and/or substance use. Regular in-home visits, after hours crisis support. Staff/Client Ratio 1:8-10.

- 20. The VI-SPDAT assessment is usually conducted within 14 days of someone accessing the homelessness support system, because evidence shows that many who first enter into the system are able to move to some form of housing within the first 14 days. Based on the results of the assessment, the individual is triaged to the appropriate intervention required.
- 21. There are no restrictions on shelter access based on acuity.
- 22. The City's approach to homelessness is grounded in the Housing First Model. In the Housing First Model the priority is obtaining housing and ensuring that appropriate supports are in place to

address other issues (substance use, mental/physical health, etc.) once housed to maintain tenancy.

- 23. The City's approach to homelessness includes various programs. These include Homelessness Prevention and Shelter Diversion, Mental Health Street Outreach, Housing Focused Street Outreach, Emergency Shelters, Transitional Housing, Rapid Rehousing, Intensive Case Management and Permanent Supportive Housing. These programs operate as part of a broader social safety net and work to ensure clients have efficient connection to the services and supports required.
- 24. The City substantially or partly funds all of the above programs, with the exception of Permanent Supportive Housing and the Mental Health Street Outreach team. Permanent supportive housing and Mental Health Street Outreach are, as explained further below, primarily funded by the province or other sources.
- 25. Homelessness Prevention and Shelter Diversion interventions provide assistance to individuals and families at risk of becoming homeless, before they become homeless. Prevention programs couple financial support (rent and utility arrears, damage deposit etc.) with case management to achieve housing stabilization.
- 26. Housing Focused Street Outreach Workers provide mobile support services to people who are experiencing homelessness and who may be disconnected from the homelessness-serving system. Outreach workers meet people in the community, helping to make connections to resources and supports and increase collaborations and co-ordination within homelessness support services. Assertive housing-focused street outreach creates and supports connections to safe, sheltered options with a focus on permanent housing. Individuals supported by Outreach are offered a referral to an existing emergency shelter or hotel, based on client choice, and are

- offered a referral to Housing First Intensive Case Management Programs (described below), as appropriate and available.
- 27. Emergency Shelters provide temporary accommodations and essential services for individuals experiencing homelessness so that they may be re-housed. Shelters can play a key role in reducing homelessness as these services focus efforts on engaging participants in the rehousing process.
- 28. The shelters and shelter system are designed to have a low barrier for access. In emergency shelters and hotels, individuals have access to various supports including but not limited to harm reduction, housing planning, access to medical services and supports to connect individuals to needed services and housing, and access to income support. Shelters also provide access to meals, facilities for personal hygiene, hygiene products, washrooms, laundry facilities, and safety. Outreach staff continue to visit and engage with people that have moved from encampments into shelters and hotels building on the relationship with those clients, and to facilitate ongoing case management with shelter case managers.
- 29. Emergency Shelters accept admissions 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Individuals can call shelters to determine if space is available or present themselves at a shelter. If no space is available at that shelter, shelter staff will assist in exploring availability at other shelter locations. The use of the HIFIS database allows shelter staff to see where available spaces exist within their sector (e.g. the Men's, Women's, Family, and Youth sectors).
- 30. Referrals are made by shelter staff to alternative housing options, where appropriate and based on the individual's need. Each shelter seeks to ensure individuals are diverted to other safe, appropriate options where possible and to ensure admission to a shelter when no other options exist.

- 31. Rapid Rehousing is such an option. It provides targeted, time-limited financial assistance and support services for those experiencing homelessness, usually episodically or transitionally, to help them quickly exit emergency shelter services and retain housing. The program targets participants with lower acuity levels using case management and financial supports to assist with the cost of housing. The length of stay is usually less than one year as the program targets those who can live independently after receiving subsidies and support services. The City funds two Rapid Rehousing programs: one through Mission Services with a 2020-2021 target of 133 individuals placed in permanent housing per year and one through the Good Shepherd for women and families with a 2020-2021 target of 87 women and 86 families placed in permanent housing per year.
- 32. Transitional Housing provides time-limited support designed to move individuals to independent living or permanent housing. The length of stay is limited and typically less than one year, though it can be as short as a few weeks. Such facilities often support those with dealing with addictions and mental health that can benefit from more intensive supports for a period of time before moving to permanent housing. Examples of target groups for this intervention include youth who require modelling of basic life skills or people who have had lengthy histories of institutionalization. Without permanent housing at exit, participants may cycle through time-limited facilities thus, stabilization in permanent housing is essential to ensure successful outcomes.
- 33. Intensive Case Management (ICM) provides longer-term case management and housing support to higher acuity participants facing long-term homelessness (chronic homelessness), addictions, and mental health issues. ICM programs support clients through regular in-home visits, providing financial support to stabilize income and maintain housing, facilitate connection to health resources, and promote reconnection with broad community support networks. The intervention is designed to serve and achieves the best outcomes with individuals with acuity scores of 8-12.
 The length of the intervention is generally between 12 and 24 months. The City of Hamilton funds

four community agencies to deliver ICM programs, serving self-identified CIS men/women, Trans Masculine/Feminine and non-binary adults:

- a. Mission Services (men) 2020-2021 target: 80 individuals placed in permanent housing per year
- b. Wesley Urban Ministries (men) 2020-2021 target: 65 individuals placed in permanent housing per year
- c. The Good Shepherd (women, youth and families) 2020-2021 target: 146 households placed in permanent housing per year (Families 35, Single Women 77, Youth 34); and
- d. Aboriginal Health Centre, Indigenous Housing Services 2020-2021 target: 53
 individuals placed in permanent housing per year.
- 34. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the ICM providers have been asked to adjust their caseload to be 1/3 from encampments, 1/3 from shelters, and 1/3 from hotels /shelter overflow. While the particular allocation may have fluctuated over the course of the pandemic, the intention is to ensure that limited ICM program spaces include a specific focus on individuals from encampments.

Supportive Housing and High Acuity Individuals

35. No City-funded program exists to *exclusively* support individuals with the highest level of acuity (13+), though as discussed below, individuals with the highest acuity are able to access City programs. Such individuals typically require assistance that is beyond the funding purview of the City, including assistance of physicians, mental health practitioners, and the Assertive Community Treatment Team (a client centred mental health service that offers a broad range

of intensive community supports to individuals experiencing serious mental health concerns), combined with a permanent supportive housing program.

- 36. Permanent Supportive Housing refers to a combination of housing assistance (e.g., rent-geared-to-income, rent supplements) and the aforementioned support services. Permanent Supportive Housing includes an average of 3+ years of case management supports, ongoing support with navigating the health system, support maintaining tenancy, reintegration into community support networks, development of wrap around supports, and clinical services to address physical or mental health, intellectual disabilities and/or substance use. There are also regular in-home visits and after-hours crisis support. Permanent Supportive Housing does not have a term of coverage (the term is indefinite). Individuals will likely live in this type of housing long term, often for years. This is required due to their level of complexity and need.
- 37. The aforementioned health supports integral to permanent supportive housing fall outside of the City's authority to fund. Such health supports are funded by the Province and require a municipal partnership with health partners to implement. Supportive Housing is funded primarily through the Province with funds also contributed by the Federal Government.
- 38. Ontario's supportive housing system includes a complex network of 20 core provincial programs and 12 related programs spread across three (3) ministries, representing a combined investment of approximately \$2 billion annually. Each ministry's programs tends to assist distinct populations:
 - a. Ministry of Health (MOH): Mental health and addictions challenges, at-risk seniors, people with physical disabilities, people with acquired brain injuries and people with HIV/AIDS.

- b. Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services (MCCSS): People with developmental disabilities, youth, Indigenous people and people experiencing or at risk of experiencing gender based violence and human trafficking.
- c. Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH): People experiencing or at risk of homelessness and Indigenous people.
- 39. Just some of the funding of supportive housing provided by the Province in 2018-2019 includes:
 - a. \$252.4 million (MOH) Mental Health Supportive Housing Residential Supports within Housing;
 - b. \$46.4 million (MOH) Rent Supplement Program;
 - c. \$32.2 million (MOH) Dedicated Supportive Housing;
 - d. \$5.5 million (MMAH) Indigenous Supportive Housing;
 - e. \$323.7 million (MMAH) Community Homelessness Prevention Initiative;
 - f. \$50 million (MMAH) Home for Good;
 - g. \$13.1 million (MCCSS) Dedicated Supportive Housing;
 - h. \$16.2 million (MCCSS) Transitional Housing Support; and
 - i. \$2.8 million (MCCSS) Indigenous Mental Health and Addictions.
- 40. While it was not possible to obtain updated figures in time for this Affidavit, the 2020-2021 funding is similar to the 2018-2019 figures.

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41. Notwithstanding the City has no control over funding for programs for high-acuity persons, City-funded programs remain dedicated to supporting high-acuity people who experience homelessness. Although the Intensive Case Management programs are contracted and designed to effectively support those with acuity up to 12, their contracts allow for higher needs individuals to be taken on when approved and requested by the City. The ICM programs have done so at the City's request throughout the encampment response.

The Emergency Shelter System in Hamilton

- 42. The emergency shelter system in the City of Hamilton is broadly divided into:
 - a. the Men's sector;
 - b. the Women's sector (which includes women and women with children);
 - c. the Family Sector; and
 - d. the Youth Shelter.
- 43. The Men's emergency shelter sector is composed of:
 - a. Good Shepherd Men's Centre;
 - b. Mission Services Men's Centre;
 - c. Salvation Army Booth Centre;
 - d. An emergency shelter located at 378 Main Street East (the former Cathedral Boys School) operated by the Good Shepherd; and
 - e. Hotels (since COVID-19) operated by Mission Services.

- 44. The Women's emergency shelter sector is composed of:
 - a. Mary's Place operated by Good Shepherd;
 - b. Emma's Place;
 - c. St. Joseph's Womankind;
 - d. A Hotel (since COVID-19) operated by the Good Shepherd;
 - e. Hotels (since COVID-19) operated by Mission Services.
- 45. More generally, Mission Services operates emergency shelters through hotels for women, men, couples, and shelter overflow.
- 46. Additionally, the City can place families in hotels, with support from City staff, when required.
- 47. There are also four Violence Against Women ("VAW") emergency shelters which are not funded through the City, but through the Ministry of Community and Social Services ("MCSS"): Inasmuch House, Interval House, Martha's House and the Native Women's Centre. The City of Hamilton pays for "overflow" beds in each of the four VAW shelters (between 4-6 beds at each location). When the MCSS funded beds are full, if the VAW shelter puts women in those beds, the City pays for the overflow space. If the overflow beds at the respective locations are full, the City will then place that woman/family in a hotel at the City's expense.
- 48. Carole Anne's Place and Willow's Place are drop-ins serving single women experiencing homelessness.
- 49. The youth shelter is located at the Good Shepherd Notre Dame.

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- 50. The Family emergency shelter is located at the Good Shepherd Family Centre. A Hotel also provides rooms to couples with no children.
- 51. The Wesley Drop-In serves single men and women.
- 52. Hotels are not named in order to protect the people using them and the hotels.

Increase of Shelter Facilities and Services during COVID-19

- 53. The COVID-19 pandemic prompted the City to expand its facilities and services in order to address the needs of people experiencing homelessness during the pandemic.
- 54. The City maintains an isolation centre, currently located at Wesley with approximately 15 beds to serve men and women who need to isolate due to COVID-19; as well as five family townhouse units to serve families who must isolate. Due to distancing requirements, the number of beds for individuals in the family townhouse units can accommodate up to five people per unit, or up to 25 people total.
- 55. In addition, in consultation with public health, space within existing shelters was reconfigured to maximize capacity while maintaining social distancing. This resulted in the reduction in the number of shelter beds available in some shelters which was compensated for by the expansion of shelter operations into hotels to make up for the loss of shelter beds and to increase shelter capacity during COVID-19 to above the pre-COVID-19 emergency shelter capacity. The City has allocated funding for some of the shelters to make capital improvements in order to return to pre-COVID-10 shelter capacity while maintaining appropriate distancing.
- 56. The City has ensured food provision for individuals at all hotels and provision of staffing and additional supports to clients receiving emergency shelter in these hotel rooms. All hotels offer

ongoing harm reduction support as well as case management support with a focus on housing plans.

57. The City also established a temporary shelter for men with capacity for up to 80 people, operated by Good Shepherd Centres, to compensate for the existing men's shelters reducing capacity to allow for physical distancing. This temporary shelter was initially located at First Ontario Centre and is currently located at located at the former Cathedral Boys School on Main Street East, where it is still able to provide shelter to up to 80 people however currently its capacity is 60 people in accordance with current demand.

- 58. In response to the impact of COVID-19 on shelters the City implemented a number of additional measures, including:
 - a. providing transportation support for people experiencing homelessness;

- b. providing PPE to shelter staff and occupants;
- extending drop-in services and hours and length of season for men and women in four locations;
- d. an increase in the in Street Outreach Team by the equivalent of 3.5 full time positions;
- e. a focus by the Street Outreach Team on encampments;
- f. use of rent supplements / Canada Ontario Housing Benefit to fund access to housing units;
- g. providing funding to community organizations for additional peer outreach workers and program supplies;
- h. conducting daily, intensive engagement with a housing focus at encampments through outreach, the Social Navigator Program and other community partners;
- conducting bi-weekly case conferences with Intensive Case Managers, Outreach and community partners to assess appropriate housing options and match opportunities with individuals;
- initiating contact with Home and Community Care to discuss higher-acuity cases that need more than ICM housing supports;
- conducting 3 separate weekly sector calls (Women's; Men's; System wide), in which community organizations are able to participate, to discuss options for collaboration, support, and addressing barriers;
- I. providing flexibility with the Housing Stability Benefit¹;

¹ Housing Stability Benefit is accessible to people in receipt of social assistance (OW/ODSP) and those considered low income. It normally has maximum allowable amounts within the preceding 24-month period (\$800 for single

- m. coordinating delivery of more than \$550,000 from the provincial and federal government to 27 local agencies for expenses such as food, enhanced cleaning, Personal Protective Equipment; and
- n. leading weekly calls with partner agencies to identify emerging issues and coordinate responses.
- 59. In short, the City's approach to encampments during COVID-19 has been to focus on the safety of encampment residents and other residents of the City and to increase efforts to assist in moving encampment residents to sustainable, longer-term housing and appropriate care based on their needs.
- 60. The City has developed a framework to guide its transition from emergency COVID-19 response to adaption and transformation of its shelter services. A key component of the framework is maintaining the appropriate number of emergency beds currently available. In order to do so, the City has provided funding to:
 - a. Good Shepherd Centre Hamilton to set up and operate the former Cathedral Boys School as a temporary shelter for 45 men for the period of September 29, 2020 to June 30, 2021. This facility has changed its capacity based on need, which as noted above is currently 60 beds but can accommodate up to 80. This new facility includes: meals and snacks for all of those accommodated; lounge space; recreational activities; medical services through a nurse practitioner and the Shelter Health Network; harm reduction supports; case management and housing support services; and outreach services provided through other agencies including Ontario Works.

individuals or couples with no children; \$1500 for families). There are also eligible items that an individual can apply for (i.e.: rent arrears; last month's rent deposit; mattresses; utility arrears; etc.). Through COVID, additional flexibility has been granted in that people who may have already received their maximum entitlement have still be granted a benefit and people who have been granted items under exceptional circumstances that are not normally covered (e.g. washing machines).

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b. Mission Services to create partitions between beds in their dormitory style room and to create 10 individual rooms. This will allow Mission Services to operate at their original

capacity of 58 beds.

c. renovate the Salvation Army Booth Centre in order to create partitions in the dormitories

and single rooms to allow the shelter capacity to return to its original 82 bed limit.

61. The above-referenced reconfiguration of space within existing shelters is to maximize capacity

while ensuring social distancing and promoting infection control.

Shelter Space Availability

62. For the month of September 2021, to present, the occupancy levels of the City's Emergency

Shelter system may be summarized as follows:

Emergency Shelters

Women's Emergency Shelters: 108%

Family Emergency Shelter: 99%

Youth Emergency Shelter: 61%

Men's Emergency Shelter: 97%

Overflow Locations

Cathedral (men): 38% (of 60 beds)

Hotel (couples & women): 95%

Hotel (Family): equivalent to 100%, placement as needed

Hotel (Women): 89%

63. These figures show that in September 2021 to present, there is room in the men's, youth, and

family sectors. There is limited space in the hotel overflow for women and couples.

- 64. When interpreting these figures important to note that bed availability is extremely fluid and changes rapidly, often on an hourly basis. If a person calls for a space at one point in a day, it is possible capacity may change later in the day or the following day.
- 65. As well, regarding hotel space, at times hotel rooms that would otherwise be available, become temporarily unavailable pending repairs due to damages.
- 66. When shelter space is not available, there are often other options available, which staff are able to help people pursue, particularly for women; such as overnight drop-in space.
- 67. With respect to the women's system, the City has provided the largest increase in funding to the women's system over the past few years to meet the growing demand.
- 68. The City emergency shelter system is able to accommodate couples in the Family shelter, or hotel rooms in the absence of space in Family shelter.
- 69. The City is continually examining our shelter capacity and looking for opportunities to mitigate some of the demand pressures on the system. For example, the City has recently, as of October 2, 2021, opened a new temporary 15-bed shelter for single women. We continue to explore other opportunities to ensure shelter availability meets the needs of those who wish to access it.

SUPPLEMENTARY AFFIDAVIT OF ROBERTO MASTROIANNI (SWORN OCTOBER 12, 2021)

- I, ROBERTO MASTROIANNI, of the City of Hamilton, in the Province of Ontario, MAKE OATH AND SAY:
- 1. I am employed by the City of Hamilton (the "City") as the Manager of the Residential Care Facilities Subsidy Program & Emergency Shelter Services within the Healthy & Safe Community Department of the City of Hamilton's Housing Services Division. My role includes, among other responsibilities, oversight of the City's Emergency Shelter Services and Housing Focused Street Outreach Team ("Outreach team"). I have knowledge of the matters set out in my affidavit. Where I rely on the information of others, I state the source of that information and verily believe it to be true.

Funding and Budget Resources for Homelessness and Emergency Shelters

- 2. As an update to paragraph 8 of my October 6, 2021 Affidavit, the 2021-2022 budget resources allocated for homelessness and emergency shelters available to the City are:
 - (a) The Federal Government Funding allotment for 2021-2022 through "Reaching Home" is \$10,424,159.
 - (b) The Provincial Government Funding allotment for 2021-2022 through "Community Homelessness Prevention Initiative" ("CHPI") is \$19,645,911.
 - (c) An additional \$1,000,000 was provided by the Provincial Government for 2021-2022 through "Home for Good".
 - (d) An additional \$4,459,180 comes from the City of Hamilton Levy for 2021.
 - (e) In addition to the base funding described above, the City of Hamilton has received COVID-19 related funding for 2021-2022 to address the needs of the homelessness serving system during the pandemic. The COVID-19 related funding is as follows:
 - (f) Social Services Relief Fund (SSRF) (Provincial) \$26,124,538.
- 3. As an update to paragraph 11 to my October 6, 2021 Affidavit, since the start of COVID-19, in 2020, the City has spent and is committed to spend the following amounts on the shelter system:

4. I note that March 2021 total shows a credit, which is due to past-month costs being adjusted across different account sections, where costs stayed in their correct months, but the offsetting credit was applied in March (the fiscal year end).

Shelter Occupancy

5. Attached hereto and marked as **Exhibit** "A" to this my Affidavit is a chart summarizing the shelter occupancy rates from January 2021 and September 2021. The spaces per night indicate capacity, with the exception of hotel overflow for families, which

is not a static number as the hotels are booked on an as needed basis. The occupancy percentages indicate the average occupancy percentage of the available shelter or hotel capacity for the particular month. For example, in September the 81 women's shelter spaces were at 90% capacity. This means that the women's shelter spaces were full 90% of the time. I also note that the hotel overflow for families does not have a set capacity. The figures in Exhibit A are the number of unique individuals served per month.

- 6. Because we do not have a set number of hotel rooms/beds booked in the families hotel (which is different from the way we block book rooms in the other hotels), we cannot produce an average occupancy. Because there is not a set number of rooms, there is no comparator, so the occupancy percentage would in essence always be 100%. For example, if we had 2 families for the hotel, we call the hotel ad hoc and place those two families, resulting in 100% occupancy. Similarly, if we place 30 families in hotel, the same ad hoc booking occurs and it still results in 100% occupancy.
- 7. Individuals are first referred to permanent shelter locations and only referred to hotels where there is no space in the shelters, or where the particular individual is not able to be admitted to the shelters (i.e.: a Service Restriction, conflict of interest, etc.). For example, where a single woman wants to access a shelter space, we first refer to all emergency shelters. If the shelters are full, an assessment for space at the wholly 'female hotel overflow' is completed. If that is full, then an assessment for space at the 'couples, men, and women hotel overflow' is completed. There have been occasions where no space was available at hotels or shelters.

8. In paragraph 69 of my affidavit sworn October 6, I referenced the new 15 bed women's shelter opened as of October 2, 2021. This increases the capacity of the women's shelter segment by 15 beds. This temporary shelter is approved to operate for up to 2 years from the date of opening. The City is currently exploring plans for a further women's emergency shelter site.

Duration of Encampments

- 9. In the time frame between October 2020 and before September 2021, the City, of its own volition, implemented a By-Law Enforcement Protocol (the "**Protocol**") which permitted encampments to remain in certain areas for up to 14 days provided there were no health or safety concerns presented by the encampment. The Protocol was the result of a negotiated resolution of an interlocutory injunction obtained by encampment supporters in July 2020. However, the City was not obligated to follow the Protocol indefinitely. At a meeting that took place on August 9, 2021, Hamilton City Council decided to no longer follow the Protocol.
- 10. Thereafter, following a three week wind-down, effective August 30, 2021 the City implemented the six step Encampment Process pursuant to the Encampment Response Update (PED21188/HSC20038(c)) (the "Encampment Process").
- 11. During the time period in which the Protocol was in effect, in most cases, occupants of the encampments remained in place longer than 14 days. This was the case notwithstanding that 14 days was the maximum time that was permitted under the By-Law Enforcement Protocol that was then in place. This timeline was the result of a number of factors.

- 12. Since the City's implementation of the Encampment Process the only sites that have been removed were those situated on prohibited grounds, as defined under the Protocol.
- 13. I have been advised by staff that 9 encampment sites were visited this past weekend which were also visited the weekend before. The number of tents has increased at eight of these sites. One has had a decrease in tents. Two weekends ago there were 34 tents at the sites, this past weekend there were 51 tents, representing an increase in 17 tents.

Level of Interaction Between Outreach and Municipal Law Enforcement ("MLE")

- 14. Not all encampments that the Outreach team is aware of and engages with are reported immediately to MLE. In effect, this means that, at any given time, there are encampments of which Outreach is aware, but not MLE.
- 15. Since the City's implementation of the Encampment Process, MLE notifies the Outreach team after MLE receives a complaint about an encampment and has attended an encampment and given the occupants notice (if the occupants did not voluntarily leave). After receiving this information, the Outreach team goes to the encampment and engages with the occupants. However, sometimes the Outreach Team may have already been aware of the encampment and was already engaging with the occupants by the time MLE received a complaint. So, in many situations, the Outreach Team is already engaging and working to support the occupants by the time MLE attends the encampment.

The Applicants were offered housing and accessed our programs

- 16. The Outreach team takes notes of the individuals that we assist. These notes are made during the outreach team's day-to-day work and are recorded in the City's HIFIS system (the homelessness sector's database) and in excel tracking tools available to the outreach staff. Based on the information we have, we have identified all five applicants as having had assistance from us or other support programs with which we engage and having been offered housing and/or emergency shelter. In some situations, the client refused the offers of support.
- 17. The Applicant Ashley Poff was in contact with our outreach team two times in 2021. According to our records, Ms. Poff frequented a downtown health centre and accessed overnight drop-ins for women. Ms. Poff was accepted into a transitional housing program in early spring 2021 and accessed drop-in programs during the day. To our knowledge, Ms. Poff was not staying in any encampments identified through the Encampment Process.
- 18. According to our records, Outreach has had a few encounters with the Applicant Darrin Marchand. The notes from Outreach state that Mr. Marchand stayed at three different encampments and sometimes at a shelter. As well, he would occasionally stay with his brother. In July 2021, he stayed in a park for two days. In August 2021, he stayed in a park for one day. According to our records, Mr. Marchand has a trespass order with one shelter due to an assault, but is still able to access shelter beds in other shelters. As of October 7, 2021, he was staying with his brother.

- 19. Regarding the Applicant Gord Smyth, according to our records he lost housing in June 2021 and Outreach offered him shelter but he declined, as it did not allow pets. The Outreach team also offered him fostering for his pet, but he declined that as well. The Outreach team also offered Mr. Smyth a housing subsidy, but he refused to complete the necessary forms. As such, he did not receive the housing subsidy. Mr. Smyth was also connected to a housing worker. He completed the necessary forms, but said he would not take the unit because of hydro costs. The housing worker planned to arrange to have the hydro paid directly to the utility company. However, Mr. Smyth declined this. Outreach and Housing staff offered pet friendly housing, at an amount Mr. Smyth was willing to pay for rent, as well as offering support while in housing. Mr. Smyth refused all options. Mr. Smyth completed an application for a low barrier unit one month ago. Our records indicate that Mr. Smyth became aggressive towards outreach staff and housing staff. As of September 2021, the Social Navigator Program has been following up with Mr. Smyth.
- 20. The Outreach team connected with the applicant Mario Muscato around July 2020 while he was staying at an encampment. When the Ferguson Avenue encampment was cleared, Outreach team were informed Mr. Muscato was moving into a Residential Care Facility. Between August 2020 and approximately April 2021, Mr. Muscato had been accessing Indigenous Housing Services. However, as of June 2021, Mr. Muscato was discharged from Indigenous Housing Services because their Outreach program staff had been unable to contact him for three months. As of October 7, 2020, Mr. Muscato was staying in a shelter.
- 21. The Applicant Shawn Arnold has spent over a year and a half in encampments, according to the Outreach team's notes. He connected with our services roughly six

months ago. He missed four appointments with our housing worker and viewed two residential units, which he declined. However, as of October 4, 2021, Mr. Arnold has secured a unit and the housing worker is waiting for him to pick up his key. Mr. Arnold is eligible to continue receiving support with the housing worker for the next two years.

APPLICATION UNDER 14.05 OF THE RULES OF CIVIL PROCEDURE

AFFIDAVIT

- I, Roberto Mastroianni, of the City of Hamilton, in the Province of Ontario, AFFIRM:
- 1. I am an employee of the City Hamilton as such I have knowledge of the matters set out in my affidavit. Where I rely on the information of others, I state the source of that information and verily believe it to be true.
- 2. I am employed by the City of Hamilton as the Manager of Homelessness & Housing Support within the Healthy & Safe Community Department of the City of Hamilton's Housing Services Division. My role includes, among other responsibilities, oversight of the City's Emergency Shelter Services, Drop-Ins, and Housing Emergency Fund.
- 3. I make this affidavit as an update and supplement to my October 6, 12 and 15, 2021 affidavits in this proceeding.¹

¹ All defined terms in my October 6, 12 and 15, 2021 affidavits have the same meaning in this affidavit.

- 4. I have reviewed my October 6, 2021 affidavit and confirm that the following paragraphs remain accurate:
 - Paragraphs 3-7, regarding the working definition of homelessness and overview of the City's role as the "system service manager" for homelessness response;
 - Paragraphs 8-12, regarding budget allocation resources, though updated figures for the period subsequent to my October 6, 2021 affidavit are provided below;
 - Paragraphs 13-25, regarding how funding is used to provide a homelessness-serving system consisting of various programs to deliver organized and professional services to people experiencing homelessness using best practices and key performance indicators, including use of the Vulnerability Index Service Prioritization Decision Assistance Tool ("VI-SPDAT") standard triage tool—and I re-emphasize that there are no restrictions on shelter access based on an individual's acuity;
 - Paragraphs 26-34, regarding the Housing Focused Street Outreach Team,
 Emergency Shelters, Referrals, Rapid Rehousing, Transitional Housing, and Intensive
 Case Management, save that I provide below updated numbers regarding these
 programs for the period subsequent to my October 6, 2021 affidavit;
 - Paragraphs 35-41, regarding supportive housing and high acuity individuals, save that I provide below updated numbers regarding these programs for the period subsequent to my October 6, 2021 affidavit;
 - Paragraphs 42-52, regarding the Emergency Shelter System, save that I provide below updated numbers regarding these programs for the period subsequent to my October 6, 2021 affidavit, particularly with respect to changes to the hotel overflow portion of the Emergency Shelter System due to the conclusion of COVID-19 funding from the provincial and federal governments; and

- Paragraphs 62-69, regarding Shelter Space Availability, save that updated occupancy figures are provided below and that subsequent developments have affected the temporary shelter referenced in paragraph 69.
- 5. I have reviewed my October 6, 2021 affidavit and confirm that the following paragraphs do not remain accurate:
 - Paragraphs 53-61, regarding COVID-19 funding and programs.
- 6. I have reviewed my October 12 and 15, 2021 affidavits, and the statements therein were accurate as of the time they were made. The statements therein continue to be true with respect to the Encampment Process that was put in place as of August 30, 2021, which remained in place and operated as I stated in my October 12 and 15, 2021 affidavits until August 23, 2023 and the advent of the presently-enacted Encampment Protocol. The presently-enacted Encampment Protocol replaced the former Encampment Process. Below, I provide updated information regarding the individual Applicants drawn from the City's HIFIS system (the homelessness serving sector database) and Excel-spreadsheet tracking tools kept by City staff.

Budget Resources Update

- 7. The following are the 2024-2025 budget resources allocated for homelessness and emergency shelters available to the City:
 - a. The Federal Government Funding allotment for 2024-2025 through the "Reaching Home" program is \$9,569,020;
 - b. The Provincial Government Funding allotment for 2024-2025 through the "Homelessness Prevention Initiative" ("**HPP**") is \$27,895,500;
 - c. An additional \$28,484,312 comes from the City of Hamilton tax levy ("**Levy**") for 2024-2025; and

- d. In addition to the base funding described above, the City of Hamilton has received one-time funding to address the needs of the homelessness serving system during the 2023-2024 Winter Season through the Federal "Reaching Home" program in the amount of \$1,594,565.00.
- 8. A portion of the provincial HPP funding is budgeted for hotels. Hotels have traditionally been used to provide shelter for families or women with children when no space was available in a family shelter. The City's 2023-2024 Fiscal Budget within HPP for hotels is \$2,200,000. Over last few years, hotel overflow expenses have steadily increased. Actual hotel expenses for 2022-2023 were approximately \$6,000,000.00, well in excess of the available budget. As a result of increased demand on hotel overflow, the City approved an additional \$3,340,548 in Levy funding for the 2024 calendar year, bringing the total amount allocated to hotel overflow pressures to over \$5,500,000.00.
- 9. Since the start of COVID-19, in 2020, the City, and the federal and provincial governments, have spent and are committed to spend the following amounts on the shelter and homelessness system in Hamilton (this does **not** include budget resources dedicated to the Hamilton Housing Focused Street Outreach Team and Encampment Response Team, or social housing programs or Residential Care Facilities, referenced below):

10. The City now utilizes both HPP and Levy funding to operate the Housing Emergency

Fund ("HEF") program. HEF formally launched July 1, 2024 as a modernized program which replaces the long standing Housing Stability Benefit (HSB) and Rent Ready (RR) programs. HEF provides financial support to individuals and families in receipt of Social Assistance (i.e. Ontario Works and/or Ontario Disability Support Program) or those living with a low income, in order to stabilize their housing or secure new housing. Funds are issues toward last months' rent deposits, rental arrears, utility arrears, etc. The total budget for HEF is \$8,585,097, with \$1,000,000.00 coming from HPP funding and the remaining \$7,585,097 from Levy funding.

- 11. Part of the funding for supportive housing in Hamilton is provided by the Province of Ontario. This includes funding through several government programs, administered through several ministries: (a) Ministry of Health (Mental Health Supportive Housing Residential Supports within Housing; Rent Supplement Program; and Dedicated Supportive Housing); (b) the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (Indigenous Supportive Housing; Community Homelessness Prevention Initiative; Home for Good) and (c) the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services (Dedicated Supportive Housing; Transitional Housing Support; and Indigenous Mental Health and Addictions). Social housing can be accessed by submitting an Access to Housing application. City staff and shelter providers assist individuals with completing Access to Housing applications.
- 12. Notwithstanding that the City has no control over funding for programs for high-acuity persons, City-funded programs remain dedicated to supporting high-acuity people who experience homelessness. Although these Intensive Case Management ("ICM") programs are contracted out and designed to effectively support those with acuity up to 12, the contracts allow for higher needs individuals to be taken on when approved and requested by the City. The ICM programs have done so at the City's request throughout the encampment response.
- 13. At present, the City-funded emergency shelter system is divided into:

- a. the Men's sector;
- b. the Women's sector (which includes women and women with children);
- c. the Family Sector; and
- d. the Youth Shelter.
- 14. The City-funded Men's emergency shelter sector is composed of:
 - a. Good Shepherd Men's Centre;
 - b. Mission Services Men's Centre; and
 - c. Salvation Army Booth Centre.
- 15. The City-funded Women's emergency shelter sector is composed of:
 - a. Mary's Place operated by Good Shepherd;
 - b. Emma's Place operated by Mission Services;
 - c. St. Joseph's Womankind;
 - d. West Avenue, a temporary shelter operated by Good Shepherd.
- 16. The City also licences an extensive system of Residential Care Facilities ("RCFs"), which provide safe and affordable supportive housing in a communal setting for people who require assistance with the daily activities of life. At present, there are over 90 licenced RCFs operating in Hamilton. Through Housing Services, the City operates the Residential Care Facility Subsidy Program, which provides financial support to approximately 750 individuals per month to reside in the above-noted spaces, supporting their permanent housing solution. The City utilizes

approximately \$8,600,00.00 of the HPP Funding toward the Residential Care Facility Subsidy Program. Many RCFs serve both men and women. Some specialize in serving those with mental illnesses, addictions and/or disabilities. Some specialize in serving youth or seniors.

- 17. There are also charities and service providers who offer temporary shelter programs in Hamilton of various sizes that are not tracked or funded by the City. One example is the YMCA, which I am aware offers 174 beds for men at its James St. facility—and has continued to shelter same, despite a recent fire that occurred there. Another example is the YWCA, which operates a Transitional Living Program including temporary housing for women at its MacNab St. facility.
- 18. Additionally, the City can place families in hotels on an *ad hoc* basis to address capacity pressures within the family system. This is supported by City staff, as well as a temporary onsite case management support team, contracted through Good Shepherd. The City contracts with hotels for a total of 52 rooms and accommodates as many families as possible within those rooms, based on family size.
- 19. There are also four Violence Against Women ("VAW") emergency shelters operating in Hamilton which are not funded by the City, but through the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services ("MCCSS"): Inasmuch House, Interval House, Martha's House and the Native Women's Centre. The City of Hamilton pays for "overflow" beds in each of the four VAW shelters (between 4-6 beds at each location). When the MCCSS funded beds are full, if the VAW shelter puts women in those beds, the City pays for the overflow space. If the overflow beds at the respective locations are full, the City will then place that woman/family in a hotel at the City's expense.
- 20. Carole Anne's Place and Willow's Place operate as "drop-in" facilities serving single women experiencing homelessness.

- 21. The Hamilton Regional Indian Centre also operates a drop-in program specifically serving individuals who identify as Indigenous and who choose to seek service from an Indigenous agency.
- 22. The youth shelter is located at the Good Shepherd Notre Dame facility.
- 23. The Family emergency shelter is located at the Good Shepherd Family Centre. A Hotel also provides rooms to couples with no children.
- 24. Wesley Urban Ministries provides housing support workers to those experiencing homelessness.
- 25. Hotels retained for overflow purposes are not named in order to protect the people using them and the hotels.
- 26. The following chart sets out the change in the number of beds available in the Citymanaged emergency shelter system in the City of Hamilton between 2020 and June 2024:

27. A table setting out the total number of City-funded shelter beds, organized by month

from January 2020 to June 2024, as prepared by my staff on July 15, 2024, is attached hereto

and marked as **Exhibit "A"**. I confirm that I have reviewed the document and that it is accurate.

28. For the month of June 2024, to present, the occupancy levels of the City-funded

emergency shelter system may be summarized as follows:

Emergency Shelters

City-funded Men's Emergency Shelters: 107%

City-funded Women's Emergency Shelters: 101%

City-funded Family Emergency Shelter: 100%

City-funded Youth Emergency Shelter: 72%

29. The City-funded Youth emergency shelter sector has capacity available, and the City-

funded Women's, Men's and Family emergency shelter sectors have overflow capacity

available. When interpreting these figures important to note that bed availability is extremely

fluid and changes rapidly, often on an hourly basis. If a person calls for a space at one point in

a day, it is possible capacity may change later in the day or the following day.

30. When City-funded shelter space is not available, there are often other options available,

which staff are able to help people pursue—particularly for women, such as overnight drop-in

space.

31. With respect to the women's system, the City has provided the largest increase in

funding to the women's system over the past few years to meet the growing demand.

32. The City emergency shelter system is able to accommodate couples in the Family shelter, or hotel rooms in the absence of space in Family shelter.

33. The City is continually examining our shelter capacity and looking for opportunities to mitigate some of the demand pressures on the system. We continue to explore other opportunities to ensure shelter availability meets the needs of those who wish to access it. For example, City Council has recently approved staff recommendations to complete a Call for Applications ("CFA"), assessing the feasibility of adding additional emergency shelter spaces in Hamilton's emergency shelter system, with a report back to Council in Fall 2024 with results. The CFA will assess the addition of the following emergency shelter spaces: Families – 200 more spaces; Men's Singles – 110 more spaces; Women's (Singles) – 50 more spaces; Couples – 55 more spaces (i.e. an additional 110 total new spaces).

Annual Winter Response Strategy

- 34. Beginning with the 2023/2024 Winter Season, the City implemented an Annual Winter Response Strategy that seeks to address capacity pressures in the emergency system through the cold winter months. De-coupled from previous practice of relying on emergency shelters to go into over-capacity when the Medical Officer of Health declares an Extreme Cold Weather Alert, this annual winter response strategy ensures additional services are in place on a nightly basis from December 1 through March 31, annually. These additional services include:
 - Warming Spaces operated through expanded hours of operation and Statutory holiday coverage at 3 designated City of Hamilton Recreation Centres;
 - b. Warming Spaces operated through statutory holiday coverage at the Hamilton Public Library's Central Branch;
 - c. 100 additional day-time drop-in spaces;

- d. 35 additional overnight drop-in spaces;
- e. Expanded hours of operation at 2 drop-in centres, resulting in 24 hour operations; and
- f. A Warming Bus running nightly from 11:00pm on a set route through the City operated through Hamilton Transit, with on-site Outreach staff providing support for individuals accessing service.

The Individual Applicants

- 35. City staff take notes regarding the individuals that we assist. As noted above, these notes are recorded in the City's HIFIS system (i.e. the homelessness sector's database) and in Excelspreadsheet tracking tools. Based on the information we have, we have identified all 19 Applicants as having obtained some assistance from the City-funded system or other support programs with which we engage, and each either obtained or has been offered housing and/or emergency shelter. In some cases, the Applicant has refused the offers of support.
- 36. The Applicant, Kristen Heegsma, engaged with a Wesley Urban Ministries caseworker in March, 2022. She submitted an Access to Housing application on March 3, 2023. According to City records, she is presently housed and has been since December 1, 2023.
- 37. The Applicant, Darrin Marchand, is presently housed and has been since October 25,2023, according to City records.
- 38. The Applicant, Gord Smyth, submitted an Access to Housing application on March 9, 2021. According to City records, he is presently housed and has been since November 19, 2021.
- 39. The Applicant, Mario Muscato, last engaged with the City-funded system in February,

- 2024. He has not submitted an Access to Housing application, but has engaged with the Hamilton Regional Indian Centre on Ottawa St. for housing support. It is not clear whether he has obtained housing through the Hamilton Regional Indian Centre, as the City is not privy to those records.
- 40. The Applicant, Shawn Arnold, has connected with an Intensive Case Management worker at Wesley Urban Ministries. According to City records, he is presently housed and has been since January 18, 2024.
- 41. The Applicant, Allen Bradley Caldwell, is deceased. He passed away on September 15, 2023. He briefly engaged with the City-funded system in 2021 and stayed in a hotel space. He did not submit an Access to Housing application.
- 42. The Applicant, Christine Delorey, stayed in a City-funded hotel space from October 21, 2020 to March 19, 2021, and as of March 20, 2021 stayed in a space at Mary's Place. As of January, 2023, she had departed from Mary's Place. According to City records, she has not interacted with the City-funded system since that time. She did not submit an Access to Housing application.
- 43. The Applicant, Glen Gnatuk, is deceased. He passed away on January 5, 2024. He resided on Bold St. in Hamilton until January 31, 2022. He engaged with a Wesley Urban Ministries caseworker in February, 2022, and thereafter obtained housing in Orillia, Ontario and then in Barrie, Ontario. As he was residing outside the City, his HIFIS file was deactivated in July, 2023.
- 44. The Applicant, Taylor Gogo-Horner, was the spouse of Glen Gnatuk. She resided on Bold St. in Hamilton until January 31, 2022. She engaged with a Wesley Urban Ministries caseworker in February, 2022, and obtained housing in Orillia, Ontario and then in Barrie,

Ontario with Mr. Gnatuk. As she was residing outside the City, her HIFIS file was deactivated in July, 2023.

- 45. The Applicant, Cassandra Jordan, resided in housing in Hamilton from May 1, 2016 to January 22, 2024, at which time she reported having lost housing due to a relationship breakdown. According to City records, she has since engaged with a YWCA drop-in centre and Mary's Place, operated by Good Shepherd, but has not made an Access to Housing application.
- 46. The Applicant, Julia Lauzon, is presently housed and has been since February 1, 2021, according to City records.
- 47. The Applicant, Ammy Lewis, is presently housed and has been since October 1, 2021, according to City records.
- 48. The Applicant, Ashley MacDonald, is presently housed and has been since October 1, 2020, according to City records.
- 49. The Applicant, Corey Monahan, made an Access to Housing application in July, 2020, and was formerly housed in 2020-2021. He thereafter engaged with both Wesley Urban Ministries and Good Shepherd. During his interactions with both organizations in 2022, he was temporarily service restricted due to bringing a weapon (knife) onto the property, aggressive conduct towards staff, and violence towards others staying in shelter. He last interacted with the City-funded system in February, 2023, according to City records, at which time he refused to communicate further with the Salvation Army Booth Centre.
- 50. The Applicant, Misty Marshall, was assisted by the City's Housing Focused Street Outreach Team in applying for Ontario Works financial support in June, 2022. She did not submit an Access to Housing application. She subsequently interacted with Willow's and

Emma's Place in August, 2023. According to City records, she has not interacted with the Cityfunded system since that time.

- 51. The Applicant, Sherri Ogden, was offered shelter on March 22, April 1 and April 7, 2022, but refused. Subsequently, she made an Access to Housing application and obtained housing on September 28, 2022. She presently remains housed, according to City records.
- 52. The Applicant, Jahmal Pierre, was housed in Hamilton in 2020-2021, and moved to different housing in 2022. Most recently, they have obtained supportive housing through Good Shepherd and have been housed since June 1, 2023, according to City records.
- 53. The Applicant, Linsley Greaves, was offered shelter on March 30, 2022, but declined. In May, 2022, he indicated to the Housing Focused Street Outreach Team that he was working with a housing caseworker, but subsequently interacted with the City-funded system at each of the men's Misson Services, Good Shepherd and Salvation Army facilities.
- 54. The Applicant, Patrick Ward, submitted an Access to Housing Application and was offered housing on November 9, 2022. He declined at that time, but he was ultimately housed on June 26, 2023. According to City records, he remains housed at present.

Note: Maximum beds are identified as the maximum available funded beds for the month. When there was no maximum number of beds documented (e.g. Sandman Hotel) or no maximum number of beds designated (e.g. Sheraton Hotel) the maximum occupied beds for the month was reported. Hotel overflow data from 2020-2022 was based on internal records while 2023-2024 the data is based on the Hamilton Housing and Homelessness Dashboard.

Prior to April 2020 hotels were not set up as a separate service provider in HIFIS. The City of Hamilton was placing clients in hotels at that time to support individual clients, but it was not tracked consistently or comprehensively in the HIFIS Database. Currently hotels are blocked booked as rooms and beds are estimated as 4 beds per room but families can often uses multiple rooms but not all beds.
