- 2 LEE RYNAR,
- 3 THE WITNESS HEREINBEFORE NAMED,
- 4 Having been duly sworn by me to testify to the truth,
- 5 testified on their oath as follows, to wit:
- 6 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MS. COX:
- 7 1 Q. Good evening, Lee. Thanks for joining us.
- 8 So the first affidavit I'm going to ask you to refer your
- 9 attention to is the second affidavit you provided. At
- 10 paragraph 3 it says:
- 11 The amount of time that the City of
- 12 Hamilton six-step enforcement process pursuant to the
- 13 encampment response update takes to implement varies.
- Can you please tell me MLE's role in this
- 15 encampment process?
- 16 A. The MLE's role, MLE's role is essentially
- 17 to go out initially to educate in the first step of the
- 18 process and identify if there's a park's bylaw that's
- 19 taking place. If there's an offence to a park's bylaw so
- 20 we will receive a complaint and go and educate. Based on
- 21 that, we will determine if it's on city-owned property or
- 22 private property.
- 23 2 Q. And can you please explain what all six
- 24 steps of that encampment process are?
- 25 **A.** So --

- 1 MS. SHORES: Yeah, he can answer that.
- 2 THE WITNESS: So the first step is we
- 3 receive the complaint and then we go out and determine if
- 4 it's private property, or public property, if it's a city
- 5 park, or if there is a violation.
- If there is a violation then we need to
- 7 educate the people and advise them of the violation and
- 8 let them know that camping in a park essentially is a
- 9 violation of the park's bylaw.
- 10 So the next step in that is to let social
- 11 outreach workers know that we've attended the site and we
- 12 spoken to an individual.
- Then the social outreach people will
- 14 attend.
- The next step after that would be that we
- 16 would notify that social outreach has attended and they
- 17 have spoken to the individuals; and if the individuals are
- 18 still remaining at the site, they haven't been able to
- 19 find housing for them, or whatever the case may be, we
- 20 will go out and let them know that it is a trespassing
- 21 issue, that they can't be in the parks and they have to
- 22 find somewhere else to go.
- 23 After that, the police Social Navigator
- 24 Program will come out and they will speak to the
- 25 individuals and try to see what they can do in terms of

- 1 finding them housing and then they will let us know if the
- 2 people have rejected their offers for housing, or if
- 3 they've left, or what the case may be.
- 4 Ultimately, the last step is for MLE to go
- 5 in and notify them that they are trespassing and they need
- 6 to leave; and if the people do not leave, then it is
- 7 forwarded on to the police services.
- 8 BY MS. COX:
- 9 3 Q. Okay. Thank you for that. And so who
- 10 forwards this information to Hamilton Police Services?
- 11 A. So the Hamilton Police Service are notified
- 12 at multiple stages. So the places we are going to, they
- 13 have already had interaction, but for our purposes we let
- 14 them know that we have been there; and street outreach
- 15 lets them know as well that they've been there, so they
- 16 are kept apprised at every stage.
- 17 4 Q. Okay. Just turning back to your original,
- 18 your first affidavit. Paragraph 3 indicates that on
- 19 September 20th, 2021, JC Beemer Park had three sites, in
- 20 parentheses, tents present and the MLE officers issued a
- 21 two-hour notice of contravention. Was that park -- pardon
- 22 me, was MLE's in attendance that day in compliance with
- 23 this encampment process you just described?
- MS. SHORES: No. Hang on, counsel. He's
- 25 not going to speak about compliance with the process.

- 1 That's a conclusion for somebody else to draw. If you
- 2 want to ask him what step of the process was being taken
- 3 at that point, that would be a proper question.
- 4 ---REFUSAL
- 5 BY MS. COX:
- 6 5 Q. Okay. So when MLE attended on
- 7 September 20th at JC Beemer Park, what step of the process
- 8 was MLE at at that time?
- 9 A. So we were at our final step which is to
- 10 let them know that they are trespassing and they are
- 11 required to leave.
- 12 6 Q. Sorry, I misheard you. What step?
- 13 A. That's the MLE's last step for MLE is to
- 14 let the people know that they are required to leave and
- 15 then the police are notified.
- 16 7 Q. Okay. To the best of your knowledge, were
- 17 police notified by MLE that it was now at their step of
- 18 the process to enforce this bylaw under the Trespass to
- 19 Property Act?
- 20 **A.** Yes.
- 21 8 Q. At paragraph 4 of that same affidavit it
- 22 states that on or around September 21st, 2021, at JC
- 23 Beemer Park the two sites that left returned shortly
- 24 thereafter. And so what I'm wondering is what stage of
- 25 the process was that encampment at at that time?

- 1 A. I'm not sure I understand. The two --
- 2 9 **Q.** Okay.
- **A.** -- that had left there?
- 4 10 Q. So you said that MLE attended September
- 5 20 at JC Beemer Park. And then you are confirming that
- 6 the two sites that left that park returned on or around
- 7 September 21st?
- 8 A. Correct.
- 9 11 Q. Okay. So when they returned on September
- 10 21st, what stage in the process was JC Beemer Park in on
- 11 that date?
- 12 **A.** It was at the last stage.
- 13 12 **Q.** Okay.
- 14 A. So the Hamilton Police Service had been
- 15 notified.
- 16 13 Q. Okay. And it states that on September 26,
- 17 MLE had to return again because there were still three
- 18 sites. And it states MLE returned to ask three sites to
- 19 leave and no further action was taken by the MLE.
- 20 Was HPS notified after that instance?
- 21 A. I don't recall to be honest.
- 22 14 Q. Okay. And referring to paragraph 6 of that
- 23 same affidavit, it states: As of October 6, 2021, the MLE
- 24 officers have asked occupants of the Durand Park
- 25 encampment to leave on a few occasions, however the MLE

- 1 did not attend the Durand Park on September 20th nor did
- 2 they take any further action with respect to the site.
- 3 So can you please tell me what stage in the
- 4 process Durand Park is in?
- 5 MS. SHORES: Sorry, at what point in time,
- 6 counsel?
- 7 BY MS. COX:
- 8 15 **Q.** October 6th.
- 9 A. Durand Park is at the last stage of the
- 10 process as well.
- 11 16 Q. So has a referral been made to HPS?
- 12 **A.** Yes.
- 13 17 Q. Okay. Thank you. Returning to your second
- 14 affidavit at paragraph number 2 it states that, the City
- 15 exercises discretion in how it deals with encampments and
- 16 their removal.
- When you refer to "the City" who are you
- 18 referring to?
- 19 A. My department.
- 20 18 Q. Okay. And so when you say MLE can exercise
- 21 discretion on how it deals with encampments, are there any
- 22 quidelines that inform that discretion?
- 23 A. So we have this step, the six steps that
- 24 you're talking about. That is essentially the guideline.
- 25 19 Q. Okay. So returning to the first affidavit

- 1 where at paragraph 3, 4, 5, and 6 we've got mention of JC
- 2 Beemer Park and an encampment at Durand Park. How does
- 3 MLE decide which park to engage with to advise them that
- 4 they are in violation of the park's bylaw? How is it
- 5 decided that JC Beemer Park was addressed by MLE prior to,
- 6 for example, Durand Park?
- 7 A. So we take complaints in, which is one way.
- 8 So a number of complaints came in. We look at the amount
- 9 of complaints that come in per park. We also look at and
- 10 we have meetings with the entire team so the outreach team
- 11 and the Hamilton Police Services and we determine how many
- 12 sites, like, how many beds are available in terms of
- 13 housing at shelters and places like that.
- So typically there is more room for males
- 15 than there is for females in housing. So JC Beemer, we
- 16 knew that it was three males there and there were no
- 17 females at that site and due to the amount of complaints
- 18 that we had received on that one, we determined that would
- 19 be one of the first sites that we would go to.
- 20 20 Q. Okay. Thank you. And so do you have a
- 21 formal policy with respect to a criteria, that, for
- 22 example, you just described that the team refers to when
- 23 going through these factors?
- 24 A. There's nothing codified in terms of
- 25 written policy, no.

- 1 21 Q. Okay. Thank you. At paragraph 3 of your
- 2 first affidavit it states that MLE officers issued a
- 3 two-hour notice of contravention.
- What do you mean by a two-hour notice of
- 5 contravention?
- A. So that's a physical form that states out
- 7 what the violation is and the compliance time. So it's a
- 8 form that says the violation under the parks bylaw and
- 9 compliance time to come into conformity with the bylaw
- 10 it's two hours from the time that it is issued.
- 11 22 Q. I see. Okay. And so this is a written
- 12 form then, a written document?
- 13 **A.** Yes.
- 14 23 **O.** How is it issued? Is it issued to an
- 15 individual, or to a tent, or one person out of the entire
- 16 encampment? Help me understand how that is issued.
- 17 A. At JC Beemer it was issued to an
- 18 individual, each individual person.
- 19 24 Q. Okay. Would you be able to produce those
- 20 for our records?
- MS. SHORES: Counsel, what's the relevance
- 22 of producing these notices?
- MS. COX: Well, we would be able to
- 24 identify the individuals impacted.
- MS. SHORES: How is that relevant to the

- 1 matters in issue in this proceeding?
- 2 MS. COX: Well, it could include the
- 3 applicants.
- 4 MS. SHORES: But even if it was the
- 5 applicants, how is that relevant to the matters at issue
- 6 in this proceeding?
- 7 MS. COX: It's relevant because it goes to
- 8 the timeframe in which they were required to move and
- 9 whether or not and they were practically -- whether
- 10 obtaining shelter or other housing options were
- 11 practically available to them.
- MS. SHORES: But I don't see how that's
- 13 really --
- 14 ---OVERLAPPING SPEAKERS RESULTING IN LAPSE IN AUDIO FEED
- MS. SHORES: Sorry.
- MS. COX: We won't know that unless we know
- 17 the individual.
- MS. SHORES: I don't see how providing an
- 19 actual copy of those notices is probative to points that
- 20 you have raised so that's a refusal.
- 21 ---REFUSAL
- 22 BY MS. COX:
- 23 25 Q. Can you, Lee, please advise us what bylaw
- 24 number, which actual bylaw was written on that notice?
- **A.** 01219.

- 1 26 **Q.** Sorry, 01?
- **A**. 219.
- 3 27 Q. Okay. And so what was the basis of the
- 4 violation?
- 5 A. It's the parks bylaw.
- 6 28 Q. But what were the residents doing that
- 7 caused the violation?
- A. You are not allowed to camp in the park.
- 9 29 Q. Okay. Back to paragraph 5. It says that
- 10 MLE returned to ask three sites to leave. So was a new
- 11 bylaw violation document issued to them or were they just
- 12 verbally asked to leave?
- 13 A. Verbal.
- 14 30 Q. Were they the same individuals who were in
- 15 attendance on September 20th?
- 16 **A.** Yes.
- 17 31 Q. Were they same individuals who were in
- 18 attendance on September 21st?
- 19 **A.** Yes.
- 20 32 Q. Okay. How do you ascertain whether
- 21 somebody has voluntarily left?
- 22 A. How do I determine if they've left? When
- 23 they've packed up all their belongings.
- 24 33 Q. On a voluntary basis. Okay. So when you
- 25 say at paragraph 3 of your first affidavit, two sites left

- 1 voluntarily. So are you saying you witnessed them packing
- 2 up their belongings and tents and leaving?
- 3 **A.** Yes.
- 4 34 **Q.** Okay.
- 5 And then we said whatever you don't want
- 6 leave to the side and we will take it away.
- 7 35 **Q.** Okay.
- 8 A. That's what they did.
- 9 36 Q. Okay. All right, Lee. Thank you for your
- 10 time. Those are all of my questions.
- 11 ---Whereupon the examination concluded at 7:16 p.m.

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

- 4 Having been duly sworn by me to testify to the truth,
- 5 testified on their oath as follows, to wit:
- 6 CROSS-EXAMINATION BY MS. SHORES:
- 7 1 Q. Good afternoon, Ms. Uppal. As we
- 8 introduced off record, my name is Bevin Shores. I'm
- 9 counsel for the respondents in this matter. We're here
- 10 to -- for a cross-examination on an affidavit that you
- 11 affirmed on October 11, 2021.
- So can you confirm that you did affirm an
- 13 affidavit October 11, 2021, in support of the application
- 14 against the City of Hamilton seeking an injunction to
- 15 prevent enforcement of the Parks bylaw?
- 16 A. Yes, I can confirm that.
- 17 2 Q. Okay. And you have that affidavit in front
- 18 of you; correct?
- 19 **A.** I do.
- 20 3 Q. Okay. Thank you. If I can direct you to
- 21 paragraph 8 of that affidavit, which I believe is on the
- 22 fourth page?
- A. Okay. My pages aren't numbered. Would you
- 24 be able just to tell me what -- oh, yes, I see the
- 25 numbering at the top. The fourth page, yes.

- 1 4 Q. Okay. Paragraph 8?
- 2 **A.** Yes.
- 3 5 Q. Okay. I'd like to direct your attention in
- 4 particular to the first sentence of that paragraph:
- 5 "We continue have difficulty finding
- 6 suitable spaces for women, and there is a list of women
- 7 who are not accessing shelter or hotel and cannot find
- 8 housing."
- 9 Do you see that?
- 10 **A.** Yes, I do.
- 11 6 Q. You said "not accessing shelter." Can you
- 12 explain what you mean by that phrase?
- 13 A. So the shelters, they can't access shelters
- 14 either because these shelters are full or because they
- 15 have service restrictions that prevent them from accessing
- 16 the shelter spaces. Or, there's also the possibility that
- 17 people might choose not to go into shelter.
- 18 7 Q. Okay. So you would agree, then, that there
- 19 are multiple reasons that women, particularly the women to
- 20 which you refer in paragraph 8 of your affidavit, may not
- 21 accept shelter, including, but not limited to, that
- 22 shelters are at capacity; correct?
- 23 A. Correct, as well as service restrictions.
- 24 8 Q. Okay. Service restrictions and some women
- 25 may choose not to seek shelter through the shelter system

- 1 I believe you said; correct?
- 2 A. Correct, yes.
- 3 9 Q. If I can direct you to paragraph 9 of your
- 4 affidavit on the same page?
- 5 **A.** Yes.
- 6 10 Q. And in particular, the third sentence there
- 7 in which it says:
- 8 "Sexual harassment, sexual assaults, and
- 9 physical assaults by men are reported by women regularly
- 10 accessing homeless shelters."
- 11 Do you see that?
- 12 **A.** Yes, I do.
- 13 11 Q. The homeless shelters that you refer to in
- 14 this sentence, those would be shelters that are segregated
- 15 by gender; correct?
- 16 A. Correct.
- 17 12 Q. Okay. So there would be no men in the
- women's shelters; correct?
- 19 A. Correct.
- 20 13 Q. Okay. And so the incidents being
- 21 perpetrated by men, if there are no men at the shelters,
- 22 would it be fair to conclude that these incidents are not
- 23 taking place at the shelters?
- A. Correct.
- 25 14 Q. So they're taking place outside of the

- 1 shelters; correct?
- 2 A. Yes, in the community. The exception would
- 3 be in the hotel, the Four Points Hotel, where men and
- 4 women have space. They may come in as a couple or they
- 5 may be segregated. And so, you know, there certainly can
- 6 be assaults in that space.
- 7 But what I was referring to was sexual
- 8 harassment, sexual assault, and physical assaults taking
- 9 place in the community.
- 10 15 Q. Okay. Including potentially in encampments
- if a woman finds herself there; correct?
- 12 A. Yeah, absolutely.
- 13 16 Q. And last, if I can direct your attention to
- 14 paragraph 12 of your affidavit, which is on I believe
- 15 page 6 at the top?
- 16 **A.** Yeah.
- 17 17 Q. And in particular, if I can point you to
- 18 the third sentence, the one that says, "those presenting
- 19 with the most complex issues."
- Do you see that there?
- 21 **A.** Yes.
- 22 18 Q. Okay. So for clarity of the record, I'll
- 23 just read that sentence here:
- 24 "Those presenting with the most complex
- 25 issues and challenging behaviours cannot be effectively

- 1 supported, and the safety of the individual, other shelter
- 2 quests, and staff and can be compromised in these
- 3 situations and result in incidents of physical violence,
- 4 self-harm, overdoses, needlestick injuries, altercations,
- 5 serious threats, and harassment."
- 6 So inherent in this statement, Ms. Uppal,
- 7 if I understand it correctly, is that the complex issues
- 8 that you've described, they require support; correct?
- 9 A. Correct.
- 10 19 Q. And in the next statement -- sentence from
- 11 the one I just read, it begins with the phrase, "shelter
- 12 staff do their best to maintain women and shelters."
- Do you see that there?
- 14 **A.** Yes.
- 15 20 Q. Okay. And by using the word "maintain," do
- 16 you mean providing the kind of supports that a person
- 17 presenting with complex issues would need?
- 18 **A.** Yes.
- 19 21 Q. Okay. Do you know that risks such as
- 20 physical violence, self-harm, overdoses, needlestick
- 21 injuries, altercations, serious threats, and harassment,
- 22 do you know that those risks never happen in encampments?
- A. No, no. I wouldn't say that.
- 24 22 **Q.** Okay. So there is a possibility of those
- 25 risks potentially presenting in encampments; correct?

- 1 **A.** Yes.
- 2 23 **Q.** Okay. Are there shelters staff
- 3 maintaining, to use your word, or providing support
- 4 services to people in encampments?
- 5 A. There are staff who work within the
- 6 homeless system where we also provide shelter who are in
- 7 supporting people in encampments. So yes, they may be --
- 8 they may have been shelter staff, they may have a dual
- 9 role as shelter staff and going in encampments, but there
- 10 are people who go into encampments who work within the
- 11 homeless system.
- 12 24 Q. Okay. And so are those people who may go
- into encampments, are they staffing the encampments in the
- same way that a shelter would be staffed by workers?
- 15 **A.** No.
- 16 25 Q. Okay. And so if one or more of those
- 17 risks, such as overdoses, altercations, threats,
- 18 harassment, if one of those risks were to present itself
- in encampment, there is no continual staffing there to
- 20 provide support in that situation; correct?
- 21 A. Correct.
- 22 26 Q. Okay. In paragraph 12 when you say in the
- 23 very last sentence -- sorry, the last clause of the last
- 24 sentence, "Encampments are an important and preferred
- option for some women in our community," whose preference

- 1 are you describing? Who is preferring encampments for
- 2 women in your community?
- 3 A. Well, we see different women who've come
- 4 forward who prefer -- who don't want to stay in our
- 5 drop-ins, who don't want to go to the hotels or shelters
- 6 and tell us they prefer to stay in encampments. We go
- 7 with -- that can vary, you know, that changes, so women
- 8 for a period who want to stay in encampments and then they
- 9 may want to leave the encampment for different reasons,
- 10 but it's not a particular type of woman, but I would say
- 11 it's women who have different reasons.
- Sorry, am I getting feedback from
- 13 somewhere?
- 14 27 Q. I'm hearing feedback too. I can still hear
- what you're saying. Can you hear me?
- 16 A. Okay. There we go, yes. Sorry.
- 17 So I was clarifying. It wasn't a
- 18 particular type of women or women with particular issues.
- 19 We have seen women who have male partners who want to stay
- 20 in the encampments. We've also seen other women who say
- 21 they don't feel comfortable coming into the drop-ins or
- 22 the shelters as they operate out of the hotels and prefer
- 23 to stay in encampments.
- 24 28 Q. Okay. So what you're describing, then, is
- 25 a personal preference by some women, not a universal



- 4 29 Q. Okay. I have nothing further for this
- 5 witness. Thank you.

- 8 30 Q. Thank you. I just have one quick redirect.
- 9 You asked about rates of domestic violence in encampments,
- 10 and so my question to the witness is: What do the rates
- of domestic violence look like in encampments compared to
- 12 their counterparts, such as in other settings that are not
- 13 encampments?
- MS. SHORES: Hang on. No, counsel, I
- 15 didn't ask about rates of domestic violence in
- 16 encampments. I asked if there was a risk of the types of
